### HELP PREVENT POLIO

You have all probably heard of the dangerous and extremely contagious disease called Poliomyelitis--polio to you, a disease that has brought on extreme fear to all San Antonio. Yet, there is a question in your mind. What is polio? What are the symptoms? How can it be prevented? Let us take the questions individually.....

#### What is Polio?

Poliomyelitis commonly referred to as infantile paralysis is a disease which is both infectious and contagious. It is caused by an invisible germ called a virus. This virus gains control of the brain and spinal cord by entering through the nose, throat and intestinal tract.

#### What are the symptoms?

The germ is present a week or ten days before symptoms appear. Then suddenly there is a high fever. The back of the neck aches and the

muscles feel inertless. Usually these symptoms are thought to be those of the flu. They pass on identically as the flu. Within a short time paralytic symptoms appear. The person is now a helpless victim of polio.

#### How is it caused?

There have been various theories as to the causes of polio. So far it is said that the fly is one of the most prominent carriers. That is why cleanliness, pasteurized milk, taking care that food does not become contaminated is emphasized. Also another theory concerns human beings as carriers. There are some who have become victims of polio without knowing it. They probably had a fever and headache for several days which passed off as grippe or flu. The person doesn't go to a doctor but it is highly possible that this may be preparalytic polio. The healthy person is probably the greatest menace and most dangerous carrier. That is why avoidance of crowds is emphasized.

Less bread can be used, fresh fruits for desserts instead of pies and cakes; Saving of kitchen fats

## HOW TO PREVENT POLIO

How can it be prevented?

1. Eliminate the house fly and mosquitoes by using D.D.T.
  2. Wash all raw food (meats, fish etc) and vegetables well.
  3. Eliminate roaches, mice and rats.
  4. Be positive your milk is pastuerized. If not Dont Buy It!
  5. Keep clean! Bathe often.
  6. Do not jump suddenly into cold water.
  7. Wash hands well before eating.
  8. Do not have tonsil and adenoid operations now.
  9. Wear clean clothes.
  10. Brush teeth well. Wash mouth with antiseptics (baking soda, listerine etc.)
  11. Keep your nasal (nose) passages clean.
  12. Visit your dentist. Get all dental corrections necessary fixed.
  13. Wash dishes in hot soapy water and rinse dishes in hot clear water.
  14. Sinks, washtubs, and other plumbing fixtures should be scoured clean and rinsed with antiseptic solution.
  15. Put all bedding equipment out in fresh air and sun daily.
  16. Keep your children at home, resting and not over-doing themselves.
- Don't let your child attend parties, theatres, picnics, dance halls or gatherings of any kind.
- Don't let your child swim in public or private pools, the San Antonio River or surrounding streams.
- Don't Let your child drink unpastuerized milk.
- Don't let your child undergo tonsil or adenoid operations.

By following these precautions you will not only help stamp out this epidemic but you will make your home safer and reliable for you and your loved ones. This is not a matter of trying or hoping to do this whenever you have time. It is a matter that must be attended to at once. Don't waste time. Do it now. Tomorrow may be too late!

## HOUSEHOLD HINTS.....

The removal of stains may easily be done at home if reliable methods are known and simple precautions are taken.

Fresh stains are easier to remove than old ones. Here are some methods of removing stains from fabrics.

### Candy and syrup

Sponge with clear warm water or wash with soap and water.

### Chewing gum

If the material will not waterspot, rub the gum stain with ice. Then scrape and rub the hardened gum out of the fabric. Or soak the spot in carbon tetrachloride kerosene, or turpentine and then wash in warm soapy water.

### Chocolate and cocoa

If the material is washable, sponge with cold water or wash with soap and water. For a stubborn chocolate stain on cotton or linen, remove with hydrogen peroxide or sodium perborate. Rinse thoroughly. Another method is to soak the stain in denatured alcohol to which a few drops of ammonia have been added but on colored fabrics or cellulose acetate, be sure to dilute the alcohol with 2 parts of water. If the fabric is not washable, use carbon tetrachloride to dissolve the grease and then sponge with hydrogen peroxide.

Do not rub a stained fabric vigorously. It roughens the material. Rinse thoroughly. Never let a chemical dry on the fabric. Spread moisture into the surrounding fabric and dry.



## FOOD SAVING RECIPES

The following recipes are recommended to help save food by substituting other ingredients.

### EGGS BAKED IN POTATO CUPS

Shape seasoned-mashed potato into balls, using about 1/3 cup for each ball. Place balls on a greased baking sheet. With a spoon press center of ball to form into cup shape. Drop an egg into each cup. Season with salt and pepper. Bake in a slow oven (325°F) for 20 minutes, or until egg is as firm as desired.

### ROLLED OATS MEAT LOAF

1 cup rolled oats  
2 cups water  
1 1/2 pound ground beef  
1/2 pound ground pork  
2 T chopped onion  
2 1/2 t salt  
1/8 t pepper  
1/2 t celery seed  
Cook the rolled oats in the usual way, in 2 cups of water. Mix all the ingredients. Form into a loaf in a piece of heavy paper and place on a rack in an open roasting pan. Bake about 10 minutes in a hot oven. Then reduce the temperature to moderate, and continue to cook for 1 1/2 hours. Serve hot or cold.

### SHEPHERD'S PIE

For a pie to serve 6 persons allow about 2 cups of seasoned mashed potato. Fill baking dish about 2/3 full of hot meat stew and cover with mashed potato and leaving a few openings for steam to escape. Place in hot oven for 25 min. until brown.


