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66-85 Public Works Director Sam Granata explained that this is the second such ordinance and covers the area bounded by Santa Rosa, Martin, Alamo and Nueva Streets.

Mayor McAllister, speaking as a property owner, not as Mayor, stated that to repair a curb is not an easy thing. Even when done in a first class way, when summer comes there is expansion and it will break. He felt that the only way to do the job is to put in a section of curb. Even then, if a contractor is careless, he is likely not to make a joint which means that the street does not meet the curb. Consequently water will seep under that and flood the basement in the buildings if there is one, or seep under the street and gradually effect the quality of paving. He asked if it be possible to have the owners to indicate their willingness to let the City handle it, or do it by bids. Then the responsibility for doing it right and the supervision thereof will rest on the City department and the chances are it will be well done. He felt it would be a cheaper proposition and it would be a better proposition.

66-85 Mr. Granata agreed it would be better this way, and asked permission to arrive at some cost figures. He added that he would prefer to do the work with his own personnel, at night, if possible, and just charge the property owner the cost of the work.

Mr. Granata was asked to work along these lines and report to the Council on it.

The amendment was requested by the Police Department to assist in the enforcement of the present ordinance where the sale of merchandise is begun on the street and consummated on private property. In answer to questions from the Council, Mr. Wolf stated that as he understood the ordinance, it is not intended to apply to street photographers, although, because of the nature of its general terms it could apply. There is a special provision in this chapter which applies to transient photographers, and if the Police Department does not use this for the purpose of considering that aspect of the solicitation, then the balance of this chapter does provide that these photographers may obtain a permit for their business.

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In connection with this resolution Mayor McAllister stated the Air Force Board of Trustees selected San Antonio as the site for the Air Force Village Retirement Center after visiting many other areas. He said that through the efforts of Mr. Ray Ellison and his Associates, who donated approximately fifteen acres of land on which to build this complex, this city was chosen and they are to be commended for their action.

PLEDGING WHOLEHEARTED AND UNQUALIFIED SUPPORT TO ALL PERSONS INTERESTED IN SUCCESSFUL OPERATION OF THE POVERTY PROGRAM.

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Mayor McAllister then made the following statement:

"You have heard the resolution and the motion and second. I want to say this in connection with the matter. I telephoned Congressman Gonzalez with regard to this situation, and he made the suggestion that we request an extension. I authorized him to contact the Washington Office and make this request. A short time afterwards, he telephoned that the request had been granted.

I would like to say to the citizens that the Economic Opportunity Development Corporation, which we formed here in San Antonio, has been functioning satisfactorily for over a year. It functioned before there was a State Office of O.E.O. After the State Office was formed, then they began to question the operation of our local Corporation. First questions were raised with regard to some of the by-laws, and I am perfectly willing to admit that some of the questions that were raised were perfectly proper.

When it was first contemplated that this Corporation would be formed, the matter was discussed by the City Council and the City Council figured, after investigation, that this would be the best way to handle the poverty program. Accordingly, the Corporation was formed. The Council selected some 25 to 30 citizens from all walks of life, but all being selected on the basis of their interest in this particular responsibility and activity. Well, when this was being done, the County indicated their interest in participating. The Council said to the County, "We will be glad to have you cooperate, and if you care to pay half of the expenses in connection with the maintenance of this office, you can select half of the Directors." That was the basis on which this Corporation was formed. The Corporation continued to function satisfactorily until the Austin Office indicated that the plan of organization was not an acceptable one.

Then the Committee was appointed that prepared and submitted the reorganization plan, but that reorganization plan was rejected by a vote of 35 to 18 of the Directors who were present. Another Committee was appointed, and that Committee has worked conscientiously and sincerely to try to meet the guidelines. When I say "Guidelines" I put quotation marks around it, because it will take more than a Philadelphia lawyer to figure out what the guidelines of O.E.O. are. At one time they make a statement that certain groups should be included and again they will make a statement that there is no requirement with regard to any particular representation.

I might say that the reorganization plan, as submitted, contemplates recognition of ethnic minority groups. They are on the Board and will be on the Board in proportion to their population. The point was made that certain areas of San Antonio and certain census tracts of San Antonio had a majority of the citizens living in those areas who had a family income of less than \$3,000 per year. Accordingly, under their reorganization plan, some 18 directors will be selected from organizations representative of those areas. I might say that the number of Directors that they propose are in excess of the percentage population, either in the ethnic groups or in the poverty areas. I am hopeful that once this thing is clearly understood, there will be no further bickering.

I might also say that there has been a team of men, sent by the Austin Office, to San Antonio to investigate the situation. They came up with a report that indicated that the proposed reorganization plan was not acceptable and yet offered no guidelines with which it could be determined what was acceptable. I think and hope that in the course of a few days this very unusual situation will be satisfactorily adjusted. I make this statement because there has been so much in the newspapers with regard to E.O.D.C. which are the initials that apply to our local corporation. I want to say that

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66-108 the 1966 Corporation Directors have conscientiously tried to do a satisfactory job. The Administration of the E.O.D.C. has functioned. There has been spent and there is in the process of spending something line \$1,700,000. It has been satisfactorily handled. That has been admitted by the Austin Office. So maybe the confusion that has existed and the uncertainty with regard to the continuation of this Corporation will be resolved shortly.

I want to say that it isn't the case at all of unwillingness on the part of the Council to recognize this opportunity to assist those citizens who are needy. As a matter of fact, the Council's intentions have been demonstrated on more than one occasion. Demonstrated by the fact that long before any other city in the state had formed a basis of operation, we formed a Corporation. Over a year ago we were, a Committee from the Council, in Washington. We were fully organized, and we have been endeavoring to avail ourselves of set benefits as the Federal government has made available for the benefit of our citizens. I make this statement because there has been so much misunderstanding. I want to say that the City Council even went so far as to say that if the other governmental agencies that are participating in this did not elect to do so that the City Council would authorize the payment of all the expenses of the operation of the E.O.D.C. so that its benefits could be made available to the citizens of San Antonio.

I furthermore want to say that I appreciate very much Congressman Gonzalez's participation in this and his request for an extension. I commend him for his initiation of the action that has provided this extension and will ultimately, I am sure, lead to a solution of what seems to be making a mountain out of a molehill.

You have heard the motion and the resolution, if there is no discussion, call the roll."

On roll call, the resolution was passed and approved by the following vote: AYES: McAllister, Calderon, Jones, James, Cockrell, Gatti, Trevino, Parker and Bremer; NAYS: None; ABSENT: None.

66-109 Mr. Frank Matera appealed to the Council to consider passing a Leash Law ordinance. He outlined various occasions where such an ordinance was needed, and stated a number of other large cities in Texas have this law. He cited examples of dogs attacking people in the streets.

Councilman Parker said a while ago the City passed an ordinance limiting the number of dogs allowed to be kept on the premises of a home and he felt that this ordinance would eliminate some of the dogs roaming the streets. He added that this recent ordinance should be given six to eight months trial.

After further discussion, Mayor Pro-Tem Gatti informed Mr. Matera that the Council is very aware of the situation and would give it serious consideration.

66-110 Mr. Madrigal, President of the San Antonio Barbers Association, requested the Council to give his organization an answer with regard to the proposed ordinance they submitted regulating barber shops.

Dr. Calderon stated he felt State Barber Inspectors could perhaps check on the sanitary aspect of barber shops remaining open after 5:00 PM, which would help control these barber shops.

66-110 Mr. Madrigal stated the State inspections would not help them with their problems.

After discussion by the Council, Dr. Parker made a motion that the Council refuse to consider establishing working hours for the barber shops or any other working classes. Seconded by Mr. Bremer, the motion carried by the following vote: AYES: Calderon, Jones, James, Cockrell, Gatti, Trevino, Parker and Bremer; NAYS: None; ABSENT: McAllister.
