

REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL
OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO, HELD IN
THE COUNCIL CHAMBER, CITY HALL, ON
THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 4, 1988.

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The meeting was called to order by the presiding officer, Mayor Henry Cisneros, with the following members present: BERRIOZABAL, WEBB, DUTMER, WING, MARTINEZ, THOMPSON, VERA, WOLFF, LABATT, HASSLOCHER, CISNEROS; Absent: NONE.

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88-06 The invocation was given by Reverend Nathan McNally, San Jose Mission.

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88-06 The members of the City Council and the audience joined in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States.

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88-06 MR. EARL HILL

Mayor Cisneros spoke of the outstanding job that Mr. Earl Hill has performed as a member and Chairman of the City Public Service Board and he introduced Mr. Hill and other members of the CPS official family present in the audience. The Mayor then spoke of the Mr. Hill's great impact on the success of CPS during his year's of service.

Mayor Cisneros then addressed the major events which occurred during the ten year tenure of Mr. Hill on the CPS Board, and presented a plaque to Mr. Hill.

Mr. Hill thanked the Mayor, the Council and the City Public Service staff for the honor and pleasure of the past ten years.

Mayor Cisneros noted that Mr. Hill was the first Black to serve on the CPS Board and also the first Black to serve as its Chairman.

Mr. Arthur Von Rosenberg, General Manager of the City Public Service Board, thanked Mr. Hill for his many contributions to CPS.

Mayor Cisneros took note of the fact that Mayor Emeritus Lila Cockrell is now the new CPS Chairman succeeding Mr. Hill.

Mayor Cisneros introduced Miss Sharon Batts, 9 year old singer of "Dear Mr. Jesus", theme song for the "Just Say No" to drugs program. Miss Batts is in San Antonio, at the invitation of the San Antonio Jaycees to sing the National Anthem at the Spurs Game this evening. He also introduced her mother, Mrs. Jan Batts and Mr. Sonny Melendrez, representing KTFM Radio, and Ms. Beverly Cox, "Just Say No" anti-drug campaign representative. He also introduced the San Antonio Jaycees President, Mr. David Garza, who was accompanying the group.

Miss Batts spoke of her travels to various cities throughout the United States singing the song for the "Just Say No" campaign and described how the song came to be written. Miss Batts then sang the song "Dear Mr. Jesus" for the Mayor, City Council and the audience.

Miss Batts spoke of the several soon-to-be-released records.

Mayor Cisneros then presented Miss Batts with the special San Antonio t-shirt, a fountain pen and an Alamo pin.

Mrs. Dutmer stated that she hopes that the child abuse and family advocacy role now with the San Antonio Police Department will be a successful venture. She took note of the fact that the District Attorney, because of economic measures no longer can afford to support these programs.

Mr. Morrow spoke of the Mayor's role as a leader of the savings bond campaign in various U.S. cities during 1987 and he read a special letter from the Treasury Secretary, James A. Baker, III, presenting a special award to San Antonio for its efforts in the savings bond campaign.

Mayor Cisneros thanked the Secretary and Mr. Morrow and he presented a San Antonio tie as a memento of his visit. Mayor Cisneros then specifically acknowledged the role of the Assistant City Manager, Alex Briseno for his hard work in this savings bond campaign for the City of San Antonio.

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In response to a question by Mr. Wolff, Mr. Stuart Summers, Director of Economic and Employment Development, discussed plans for the new One-Stop Business Center and noted that this contract will not interfere with these plans.

Mayor Cisneros thanked the Board of the Private Industry Council (PIC), for doing a tough job for the city. He spoke of the PIC's efforts in securing new businesses for San Antonio, including the large Sears Catalog Store, Sea World, etc.

Mr. Labatt spoke of his request for the City Manager to investigate possible conflicts of interest by PIC Board members.

Mayor Cisneros ruled that this particular question was not in order at this particular time.

Mr. Wolff discussed several points of contention in the investigation involving the San Antonio Alliance of Business including the possibility of a \$100,000 disallowance in program funds.

A discussion then took place concerning the city's potential exposure to liability for the funds in question.

Mr. Labatt made a motion to approve the proposed Ordinance. Mr. Webb seconded the motion.

Mr. Scott Hill, businessman and a volunteer with the March of Dimes Birth Defect Program, spoke in opposition to the proposed ordinance. He noted that no other major U.S. city has such an ordinance on its books at this time. He further noted that the "Walk America", which began in San Antonio 22 years ago, is in danger of extinction if this ordinance passes. He noted that other running and or walking events also will be adversely affected by the ordinance and he spoke of the positive results of the March of Dimes campaign in San Antonio as well as around the nation in past years. He urged that the ordinance be rewritten before being passed.

Mr. John Purnell, small businessman and representative of The Athletic Congress, spoke of the need for fundraising events that involve runs or walks in order that non-profit agencies might raise funds. He stated that he feels many such events are held in downtown San Antonio in conjunction with conventions brought to the city and he feels the ordinance will adversely affect athletes as a result.

Mrs. Dutmer noted that several organizations have voiced their concerns to her directly about the possible adverse impact of this ordinance on their parades including their choice of parade routes.

Mr. Thompson stated that he sees a need for control of parades through the downtown areas but he still questions the costs involved.

Mayor Cisneros briefly explained the rationale for the ordinance and the adverse affects of so many parades through the downtown area and of their adverse impact upon certain merchants.

Mr. Frank Perry, Director of Downtown Initiatives, spoke to the three recommended categories of parades and their projected costs. He noted that persons and or organizations have an appeal provision direct to the City Council for an exemption to this ordinance. He also noted that the business community has asked for relief under this ordinance and he spoke of the fact that Centro 21's board has voted to support the ordinance as written. He then briefly addressed a study made of how other cities handled the matter of parades.

Mr. Wing stated that his constituents are concerned for the impact that the ordinance will have on some 360 annual parade events and of the impact that those events will have on the San Antonio Police Department. He stated further that he feels the Police Department has more important things to do than to police so many parades through San Antonio.

(At this point Mayor Cisneros was obliged to leave the meeting, Mayor Pro Tem Vera presided.)

In response to a question by Mr. Martinez, Mr. Perry discussed the various parade routes outlined in the ordinance.

Mr. Martinez acknowledged that some controls are needed over parades but he voiced his concern with the cost involved for organizations wishing to hold a parade under this ordinance.

Mr. Louis J. Fox, City Manager, noted that law enforcement personnel are required for all parades.

Mr. Pat Bernal, Assistant City Attorney, who drafted the ordinance, noted that the city is liable for the acts of anyone involved in policing parades.

Mr. Fox spoke to the need for "force of law" in order to control parades through San Antonio.

Mr. Martinez stated that he feels that non-police personnel can effectively be used to handle such matters as traffic in relation to parades and he voiced his concern that affected organizations were not involved in the preliminary discussions in the drafting of this ordinance only the downtown business community. He asked that the vote on the matter be postponed until all affected groups and individuals can take part. He stated further that he feels that a mixture of police officers and non-police officers can bring about lower costs on parades.

In response to a question by Mr. Labatt, Mr. Hill stated that he also is concerned with the 60 day/30 day time frame involved in which an application for parade is brought before the city. He noted that the requirement to have the application filed no earlier than 60 days nor

later than 30 days before the parade is unrealistic since a large number of parades require more planning time after the permit is firmly granted by the city.

In response to a question by Mr. Labatt, Mr. Perry noted that verbal approval could be given for parades much earlier than formal granting of a permit if the 30 to 60 day format is used.

In response to a question by Mr. Labatt, Mr. Purnell addressed the adverse impact of the ordinance on downtown events in support of amateur athletics.

In response to a question by Mrs. Dutmer, Mr. Bernal noted that runs and or walks will not require the \$25.00 fee if they are held within the confines of any of three major San Antonio parks.

Mrs. Dutmer offered a substitute motion to postpone this matter for two weeks. Mr. Martinez seconded the motion.

Mr. Martinez spoke against the 60 day permit request provision and stated that he supports the request for a postponement at this time.

Mr. Thompson stated that he is against the city giving a firm commitment for a parade too far in advance.

Mr. Wing spoke to the history of the proposed ordinance because of the impact on the San Antonio Police Department by more than 360 parade events each year and the adverse impact that many of these parades have on certain downtown businesses.

Mr. Webb spoke to the need to control the impact of parades on certain downtown areas and of the need to control the cost to the city wherever possible.

LIGHTHOUSE FOR THE BLIND

Mrs. Dutmer noted that the San Antonio Lighthouse for the Blind, located in Mr. Wing's district has made a request for a traffic light to be located in front of the Lighthouse for the Blind on Roosevelt Avenue, so that its thirty or more blind employees can safely cross the street to catch the bus for downtown San Antonio. She noted further that city staff has recommended that they use VIA Trans as much as possible and also spoke to other reasons why the staff feels the traffic light should not be located at this area including the fact that there is not enough pedestrian traffic there to justify the cost. Mrs. Dutmer noted that she would be willing to give some of her own District 3 Discretionary Funds to this traffic light if needed. She asked the City Council members to consider some type of agreement so that the blind persons employed by the San Antonio Lighthouse for the Blind can safely cross the street to reach the bus stop near by.

Mr. Wing spoke to the many problems encountered with erecting a traffic signal at this particular location and stated that he prefers that VIA be asked to service the blind employees specifically with a VIA Trans bus at an announced quitting time each day.

Mr. Marcus Jahns, Assistant City Manager, spoke to the safety problems with locating a traffic light at this location and stated that he would be speaking with VIA to ask for their concurrence with this Council request.

CITIZENS TO BE HEARD

MR. JACK DE VAULT

Mr. De Vault, 2012 Hickory Hill, spoke to the City Council, on past history and mankind in general. He then spoke regarding the violation of their constitutional rights by police officers. He stated that he and his wife were arrested thirteen weeks ago while attempting to exercise their first amendment rights. He stated that their only concern is to attempt to speak to the women who are visiting abortion clinics.

Mr. John Harig, 3211 Le Blanc, attorney representing the Pro-Life Activists who have been arrested, stated that there have been many violations against his constitutional rights. He spoke about cases which have been upheld which protects their First Amendment rights.

Mr. Jason Roberts, 454 Sharon Drive, spoke to the Council about his concern with the manner in which the laws are being enforced which in essence suppress their constitutional rights.

A discussion then took place regarding the newly-enacted parade ordinance and the question when a permit will be required. A discussion also took place on when the parade ordinance applies and when the trespassing laws come into play.

Mr. Wing took exception to remarks made by one of the speakers that Mayor Cisneros directed the Police Chief to violate their constitutional rights.

In response to a question by Mr. Labatt, Mr. Pat Bernal, Assistant City Attorney, stated that sidewalks are not included in the new parade ordinance.

Mr. Wing asked Mr. Bernal to meet with the groups to define the clear boundaries of peaceful assembly.

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MR. GENARO CANO

Mr. Cano, representing the Meadowcliff Council, spoke to the City Council about his concerns with the nutrition programs at the Meadowcliff, Meadowridge and Macdonna Centers. He stated that many senior citizens are left without food and he is very concerned about the fact that their funding has been drastically cut. He stated that he has spoken to one of the staff members who stated that 45 meals a day had been cut.

Mrs. Dutmer stated that she is the AACOG Chairwoman and Medina County is responsible for some of the funding of the Meadowcliff Center. She stated that while the City of San Antonio is short of funds, Medina County may have additional funding.

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MR. CONNIE TRUSS

Mr. Truss, 2506 Sally Gay, spoke to the City Council regarding a zoning violation case at the corner of Monticello and Betty Jean. She stated that the areas have recently been rezoned and is being used for construction. He asked for a definition of "D" zoning. He also spoke of the noise disruption and the traffic congestion it has also caused the neighborhood.

Mrs. Dutmer stated that she has reviewed the case in point, and described the disruption the project has indeed caused. She stated that the City needs to do something about this to alleviate the disruption to the subdivisions.

Mr. Martin Rodriguez, Acting Manager for the Code Compliance Unit, stated that he will be investigating this situation early tomorrow morning.

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There being no further business to come before the City Council,
the meeting was adjourned at 5:35 P.M.
