

REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL  
OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO, HELD IN  
THE COUNCIL CHAMBER, CITY HALL, ON  
THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 1987.

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The meeting was called to order at 1:00 P.M. by the presiding officer, Mayor Henry Cisneros, with the following members present: BERRIOZABAL, WEBB, DUTMER, WING, MARTINEZ, THOMPSON, VERA, HARRINGTON, LABATT, HASSLOCHER, CISNEROS. Absent: NONE.

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87-11 The invocation was given by Reverend Troy Bell, Sr., East St. Paul United Methodist Church.

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87-11 The members of the City Council and the audience joined in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States.

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87-11 WILLIE LOUIS BROWN

Mayor Cisneros introduced Mr. Willie Louis Brown, speaker of the California Assembly, who is a native of Mineola Texas. The Mayor then spoke briefly of Mr. Brown's background as both a state and national figure and read and presented him an Alcalde de La Villita.

The Mayor then presented Mr. Brown with an official book on San Antonio and a San Antonio necktie.

Mr. Webb introduced the president of St. Philip's College and the Chancellor of the Alamo Area Community College, Dr. Ivory Nelson in addition to several other professors who are present in the audience today for this occasion. He noted that Mr. Brown had spoken earlier today at St. Philip's College on behalf of Black History Month.

Mayor Cisneros spoke of the progress and potential of blacks in today's world.

Mr. Brown thanked the Mayor and Council for the honor and for the gifts, stating that he hopes Texas will hold onto its native talent in the future.

Mayor Cisneros asked the winners in the "Mayor for a Day" essay contest to come forward and take their seats around the City Council table alongside their Council counterparts.

Ms. Mary Alice Cisneros, a spokesperson for the Commission on Children and Families, briefly explained the essay contest and then asked each young student to rise, state their name and school, age and speak briefly about his or her ambitions.

The Mayor and City Council joined the audience in a round of applause for the eleven young essay contest winners.

Mayor Cisneros thanked his wife and other Commission members for their hard work for the Commission on Children and Families and then he spoke of the reasons why children drop out of school and get into trouble.

Mayor Cisneros then read special citations prepared for each of the essay contest winners and the members of the City Council then presented them to their young counterparts. Each contest winner was also presented with a special All America City t-shirt.

Mr. James Rodriguez, Jr., one of the essay contest winners read a brief statement on how he feels a 24 hour call in service for kids could benefit San Antonio.

Mayor Cisneros then briefly recognized the parents of the eleven young winners who are present in the audience today.

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Mr. Howard Freeman, Assistant Superintendant, City Public Service, stated that a bid recheck indicated that Shearson Lehman Brothers had actually submitted the winning bid with the best interest rate of 7.01273%. Mr. Freeman stated that this good interest rate compares favorably to recent refunding bond sales by City Public Service and he briefly described the recalculations of bids and of the discovery that an error had been made in an earlier preliminary calculation of the bid before Council meeting.

Mr. Harrington made a motion to approve the proposed Ordinance. Mr. Hasslocher seconded the motion.

Mrs. Vera noted that a private residence driveway had collapsed during heavy rains last night on one of the public works projects underway in her district and she asked that the city supply a 24 hour hot line contact of each contractor so that citizens might be able to reach them to remedy such problems. She noted that as a result of the collapsed driveway the residents could not back their automobile in order to get to work this morning.

Mr. David Steitle, Director of Public Works, spoke to inclusion of this in bids for projects to be opened shortly.

Mr. Martinez briefly described the work to be performed under this project and thanked the COPS organization for its support.

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87-11 At this time Mayor Cisneros asked that the City Council undertake discussion of Agenda Item #46, that being the contract with the Police Officer's Association, and asked that it be discussed at this time. By informal concensus, the City Council allowed #46 to be undertaken at this time.

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87-11 The Clerk read the following Ordinance:

AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE A CONTRACT WITH THE POLICE OFFICERS' ASSOCIATION; AND APPROPRIATING THE NECESSARY FUNDS FOR BOTH THE FIRE AND POLICE CONTRACTS.

Mr. Hasslocher made a motion to approve the proposed Ordinance. Mr. Webb seconded the motion.

Mayor Cisneros introduced representatives of the Police Officers' Association and the City's negotiating team all present in the audience today. He stated further that he feels personally this is a good contract and he thanked both sides for their negotiating efforts.

Mr. Thompson spoke of the alarming rise of burglaries in his district.

Mr. William Gibson, acting Chief of Police, stated that he would provide Mr. Thompson with the up to date figures on the incidence of burglaries in District 6. He stated further that he feels San Antonio has a 40% solution rate to its burglaries city wide and is seeking to better that.

Mr. Thompson spoke in support of the police pay raise but stated that he wants it to mean an increased rate of protection and an overall better job by police in solving such things as burglaries. He noted that citizens pay a good pay scale under this current contract and he feels that as citizens they deserve better police protection.

Mr. Labatt noted that he is philosophically concerned with having the head of the police union paid by city taxpayers for doing union work. He stated that as a result of this problem he will vote against the contract though police work in recent months, in his opinion, has been very good.

Mayor Cisneros presented a "Letter to the Editor" dated February 26, 1987 and distributed copies of the letter to members of the City Council. He noted that his letter to the editor will be dealing with what he called "the many positive changes made in the overall law enforcement program since the Tucker-Smith incident". He also outlined key provisions of the new police contract that returned more management rights to the police chief and general police management. He then spoke to a series of newspaper clippings which were attached to his letter to the editor all of which support his written comments. He then thanked the City Manager, Chief Gibson, Mr. Harold Flammia, the head of the Police Officers Association, and other members of each negotiating team for creating a new negotiating environment.

Mr. Martinez congratulated both city and police union negotiating teams stating that he supports the contract and he feels that it will make an even better police department. Mr. Martinez then spoke to his own individual concerns with the City Manager naming an interim Police Chief in the past, stating that he feels the City Council must also deal with the matter of equitable pay raises for non-uniformed city employees.

Chief Gibson spoke to the status of the new substations and their staffing, stating that he feels the citizens believe the police are coming back into the neighborhoods.

Mr. Harrington thanked Chief Gibson for his contributions to police work and to the community and stated that he would like to see Gibson named the new permanent Chief of Police. He then stated that he would be voting against the police contract because it allows the union president to draw full pay for doing union work.

(At this point, Mayor Cisneros was obliged to leave the meeting, Mayor Pro Tem Hasslocher presided.)

Chief Gibson stated that he personally would pledge his own commitment for better police service to the citizens of San Antonio.

Mrs. Dutmer stated that she supports the contract though she has received no funds from either the fire or police unions in past elections.

Mrs. Berriozabal spoke in support of the contract and she thanked Officer Esquivel of the Neighborhood Watch Program for his good suggestions made recently to her.

Mrs. Vera spoke in support of the contract though she did voice her concerns with funding of the union president's labor work at the cost of the city tax payers. She spoke of the need to increase police visibility in neighborhoods as result.

(At this point, Mayor Cisneros returned to the meeting to preside.)

Mrs. Dutmer noted that a bill before the Texas Legislature at  
this time is calling for a city to have input into proposed landfills that  
are being built adjacent to the city limits.

Mr. Frank Kiolbassa, Director of Wastewater Management, spoke to  
the city staff's opposition to this proposed landfill site. He stated  
further that staff feels it is not a good landfill site and that a public  
hearing has been scheduled before the Texas Department of Health  
concerning this proposed landfill.

Mr. Richard Clark, representing Garbage Gobbler Disposable  
Service, spoke to plans to turn an abandoned clay quarry inside the city  
of Converse into a landfill. He also distributed aerial and panoramic  
photographs of the area for City Councilmembers to see.

A brief slide show then was presented in support of the landfill proposition.

Mayor Cisneros introduced the Mayor of Converse, Bruce Friesenhahn, who was present in the audience.

Mayor Friesenhahn spoke of his residents' concerns with the proposed site for this particular landfill. He then displayed an aerial photograph of the proposed site and its proximity to nearby residences. He stated that the site's access is through a residential development and he urged the City Council to oppose the site and to approve this resolution which does that.

Mr. Randy Dym, President of the Northampton Development Corporation, spoke of his company's development of the surrounding areas into residential homesites. He then spoke of the home sales in the area and stated that some 700 homes within a mile radius of this site were sold in one year. He asked that the City Council approve this resolution and he then stated that the proposed site has been declared "Wet lands of the United States" by the U.S. Corps of Engineers.

Mr. Benedict, Marketing Director of Garbage Gobbler, stated that the city of Converse had previously objected to this same resolution. He stated that many citizens in Converse are in favor of this proposed use for this particular property and he stated that he is concerned about residential development in the area. He also stated that the landfill is a proper use of this particular property. He then spoke about the history of this particular site and spoke of the determination of quarry sites and their possible future uses. He also stated that he personally feels this use will be beneficial to the residents of the area.

Mr. Tom Buckle, attorney representing Garbage Gobbler, stated that he feels his firm is environmentally responsible to reclaim an abandoned clay pit as a landfill and he spoke of the example of successful residential areas being produced next to existing landfills and other areas.

Mr. Herb Quiroga, representing Ray Ellison Industries, stated that his firm feels the landfill will have an adverse impact upon major residential growth in this area.

In response to a question by Mr. Thompson, Mr. Clark spoke to the maximum height of landfill planned and the projected useful life of the landfill. He also spoke of several landfills operating successfully nearby to existing residential areas.

Mr. Thompson spoke against the landfill on this site.

Mrs. Dütmer spoke of out-year problems for the landfill and spoke against this site.

In response to a question by Mr. Labatt, Mr. Quiroga discussed residential sales near existing landfills.

In response to a question by Mr. Labatt, Mayor Friesenhahn discussed his reasons for opposing the landfill on this property, stating that he wants to take his case to the State Department of Health as a land use plan.

In response to another question by Mr. Labatt, Mr. Clark spoke to where landfills might also be located in future years in Bexar County.

CITIZENS TO BE HEARD

MR. JEFF JACKSON

Mr. Jackson, speaking for Reverend Juan Valenzuela, delivered to each Councilmember a statement from Reverend Valenzuela concerning the decision by Rogers Cablevision to take back cable Channel 17 from Reverend Valenzuela and to use it for other uses. He asked the City Council to intervene to ask Rogers not to cancel the Channel 17 contract and to substitute Galavision instead. Mr. Jackson stated that he feels San Antonio's audience needs hispanic programming and noted that he will appeal this matter to the Federal Communications Commission if necessary.

Mrs. Dutmer stated that she feels the City Council should review the Cablevision contract with Rogers Cablevision.

Mr. Jackson read excerpts from the letter he had received from Rogers Cablevision notifying Reverend Valenzuela of cancellation of his contract on Channel 17 during March.

Mr. Martinez stated that he feels Rogers may not be fulfilling the terms of its contract commitment for public access by doing this.

Mr. Louis J. Fox, City Manager, stated the Utilities Supervisor, Roger Ibarra would be happy to review this matter. He stated that he personally feels there may be contractual matters to be discussed between these two parties.

Mr. Martinez asked the city staff to bring both sides together to discuss this matter.

Mr. Webb stated that he would like to have Rogers Cablevision act in good faith in this matter. He noted that the federal government has taken away much of San Antonio's leverage over the cablevision franchise by law.

Mr. Fox stated that Rogers Cablevision now is seeking certain amendments to its present contract and that the city perhaps may have an option to acquire the cable television system through negotiation.

Mrs. Berriozabal stated that she is concerned that Galavision shows unrated movies.

Mr. Fox stated that he will discuss these issues with representatives of Rogers Cablevision tomorrow and will appeal to them to discuss the matter with Mr. Jackson.

MR. MARK PADILLA

Mr. Padilla spoke to the rise in most crime statistics in the Woodlawn Lake area.

Mrs. Berriozabal spoke to the need to organize this particular neighborhood to have a meeting and to ask for police instruction into forming a neighborhood organization. She asked Mr. Padilla to meet with Sergeant Ralph Lopez to briefly discuss this matter after the meeting.

- - -  
MR. ROBERT SMITH

Mr. Robert Smith, a shopowner located in Menger Hotel spoke to the City Council about his concern concerning the vendors presently using Alamo Plaza. He then voiced the concerns that he and others have about the suggestions made by the Council that the vendors be moved to the Menger Hotel where his shop is located. He spoke of the many problems caused by the vendors in this area and that these vendors are not just raspa vendors as approved by the City Council, but rather selling dresses, sweaters and other clothing items.

Miss Jo Cox, representing the Menger Hotel, reiterated the comments made by Mr. Smith. Miss Cox also spoke about the problems concerning all of the vendors not simply the raspa vendors on Alamo Plaza.

Miss Beeper Smith, Convention coordinator, stated that she was speaking to the negative affect of the vendors on Alamo Plaza, stating that the Alamo and the River are the city's most famous attractions for its big tourist trade and she spoke of the problems caused by the buses also located in this area.

Mrs. Berriozabal stated that the city staff has been asked to review the matter of horsedrawn carriages and tour buses on Alamo Plaza and report back to the Council on the possibility of eliminating them from this particular area. Mrs. Berriozabal then stated that there must be a compromise somewhere between both sides because downtown belongs to everyone in San Antonio.

Mrs. Dutmer stated that she was under the impression that her motion addressed all vendors not simply one set.

Mrs. Dutmer also stated that the vendors were prohibited on Alamo Plaza prior to 1977.

Mr. Robert Benavides, of the William B. Travis Chapter, Sons of the Republic of Texas, stated that the majority of his board has not agreed to a compromise in this matter and he stated that the tourists come to see the Alamo not the raspa vendors. He then stated that he believes that the Alamo is a shrine and no vendors should be allowed in front of it. He noted that the compromise of moving the vendors to the front of the Menger Hotel is not a good solution and he also expressed his own concern about the raspa industry being exempted from health regulations of the city.

Mayor Pro Tem Hasslocher asked acting Police Chief William Gibson to respond concerning questions about police procedures on reporting of assaults and sex crimes.

Acting Chief Gibson stated that no procedure in this regard has been changed. He then stated that the memorandum issued by the Sergeant was miscommunicated. He then noted that the purpose of the memo was to remind citizens that they should call the police if they have not heard from the police in answer to their request for assistance. He then described the sequence of events in the immediate handling of a recent rape case.

\* \* \* \*

Mayor Pro Tem Hasslocher spoke of having received a letter from a local physician who stated that he had been stopped for speeding by a police officer and had been unduly delayed while he was on route to treating a patient as a result.

Mr. William Gibson, acting Chief of Police, stated that if an officer perceives an emergency he will not unduly delay a physician under any case.

Mayor Pro Tem Hasslocher then delivered the letter in question to Chief Gibson for his answer.

\* \* \* \*

Mayor Pro Tem Hasslocher then read from another letter from Representative Ciro Rodriguez, concerning House Bill 439, as requested by Councilman Walter Martinez. He then spoke briefly to the substance of the bill which would allow housing authorities to raise their board membership from five to seven members. He noted that Representative Rodriguez has asked the City Council to pass a resolution in support of his pending legislation and he asked the matter be referred to city staff for a reply from the San Antonio Housing Authority as to its stance in the matter. Mayor Pro Tem Hasslocher then referred the letter to Assistant City Manager, Rolando Bono for action.

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OUTSIDE SOCIAL SERVICES

Mr. Wing briefly explained the report being handed out to members of the Council concerning outside social services funded by the city.

Mr. Kevin Moriarty, Director of Human Resources and Services, then distributed copies of the report and narrated a brief slide show showing the distribution of social services throughout the city of San Antonio.

Mr. Louis J. Fox, City Manager, stated that he would put the full substance of this report on the "A" session for next week.

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There being no further business to come before the City Council, the meeting was adjourned at 6:25 P.M.
