

MEETING OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO

THURSDAY, JULY 13TH A. D. 1916 4 P. M.

PRESENT: Honorable Clinton G. Brown, Mayor, presiding, and Commissioners Garland, Lambert, Kearny and Uhr.

Minutes of previous meeting were ordered approved.

----- MEMORIALS AND PETITIONS-----

Communication from acting Superintendent of United States Experimental Farm in regard to Water supply was read and referred to Commissioner of Sanitation, Parks and Public Buildings.

Petition of residents at Englewood and Hillcrest for more time to make Sewer connections, was read and referred to Commissioner of Sanitation, Parks and Public Property.

Petitions of J. Du Puy, and F. W. Church for correction of assessment, were read and referred to Commissioner of Taxation.

Petition of citizens for crosswalks on W.Cypress and Woodlief Streets was read and referred to Commissioner of Streets, Bridges and Public Improvements.

On motion of Commissioner Kearny, duly seconded and carried, a hearing was given owners of property interested in the improvement of the following streets:

AN ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Commissioners of the City of San Antonio, that, the Mayor be and he is hereby authorized to draw a warrant each and every month of the fiscal year 1916, against the 1916 General Fund, in the sum of One Hundred Dollars, made payable to the Commanding Officer of Battery B Texas State Militia.

This ordinance is hereby declared to be of urgent importance for reasons of public welfare apparent herefrom, and the same shall take effect at once.

Commissioner of Taxation, Garland, recommended that petition of Thomas Lott, for correction of assessment, and petition of L. A. Kerr, for refund of taxes, be granted. Adopted.

Commissioner Garland introduced an ordinance extending the franchise of the Texas Transportation Company for a period of twenty years.

AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance extending for ten years (20) a certain franchise heretofore granted by this City to the Texas Transportation Company.

MB-2

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

That the term of a certain franchise heretofore, to-wit-on December 6th. 1897, by ordinance of the City Council of the City of San Antonio duly passed and approved, granted to the Texas Transportation Company, a corporation organized under the laws of Texas, be and the same is hereby extended and confirmed to include a period of Ten (10) years from and after the expiration of said existing franchise, over the route or line now used by

the tracks of said company, viz., upon and over the following described portions of the public streets of the City of San Antonio, viz., beginning on Austin Street at the junction of the tracks of the Texas Transportation Company, with the track of the G. H. & S. A. R. R. Company, thence across or along Austin Street to Grand Avenue, thence along Grand Avenue, now known as Eleventh Street, and Jones Avenue, crossing San Antonio River on trestle to Dallas Street, also across Avenue A; this extension, however, to be subject to all provisions, conditions, reservations and stipulations in said original ordinance contained, in so far as applicable, including the existing and applicable obligation on the part of said Company to pay to the City the sum One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars per annum on June 1st of each year; and shall also be subject to all provisions contained in the existing charter and lawful ordinances of said City, which shall control in any conflict between such charter or ordinances and the provisions of said franchise ordinance; and shall also be subject to all further rights of regulation by law or charter, or by action of the governing body of said City thereunder, which are, or may be, exercised consistently with the Constitution of the State of Texas.

AN ORDINANCE

To satisfy in part a judgement obtained upon March 31, 1905, by the San Antonio Loan and Trust Company against the City of San Antonio; Five Thousand (\$5000.00) Dollars of said judgement having been heretofore paid by the City on the 8 day of Nov A.D. 1915.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

That the sum of Ten Thousand and Sixty Two and 50/100 (\$10,062.50) Dollars be and is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund of 1916 as a partial payment upon a judgement obtained by the San Antonio Loan and Trust Company against the City of San Antonio on March 31, 1905, which judgement was afterwards affirmed by the Supreme Court:

And that a warrant issue for same payable to San Antonio Loan and Trust Company.

Commissioner Garland introduced the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

A RESOLUTION

Inviting Bids for Deposits of City Funds.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

WHEREAS the City of San Antonio desires to select depositories for city funds for the ensuing period of one year or more:

NOW THEREFORE, said City hereby invites proposals from each bank, banker or trust company in the City of San Antonio, desiring to be selected as such depository of city funds; such proposals, duly signed and inclosed under seal, to be delivered to the City Clerk on or before the 24th day of July, A. D. 1916 at 4 o'clock P.M., at which time (subject to postponement of one week on order of the Commissioners) the same will be opened at a meeting of said Board of Commissioners who will thereupon make selection and designation of such depository or depositories of city funds, and thereafter receive and consider the depository bonds tendered by such bidders, all as provided

by law and the charter and ordinances of said City.

Each such proposal shall state the rate of interest, not to be less than three per cent, on daily balances, payable monthly, which the bidder offers to pay to the City;

And each proposal which contemplates a deposit with the bidder of less than the whole of the funds of the City, shall state whether the bidder desires to become a general depository or a special depository, and shall designate the character and amount or proportion of such deposits desired;

And such bidder proposing to become a general depository will be expected to include or combine in such proposal, or to file in a separate proposal at the same time and in the ^{same} manner, an additional proposal in writing stating the terms and conditions upon which such bidder proposes to loan to the City of San Antonio, from time to time as needed, such sum or sums as said Board of Commissioners may desire to borrow for the use of the City for cashing City warrants in anticipation of the receipts of taxes and current revenues of the City for the current fiscal year which will be pledged as security for such loans; all as provided by the charter and ordinances of said City, reference being specially made hereby to what is known as the "Finance Ordinances"

And the City Clerk is hereby directed to cause notice of the foregoing resolution to be published not less than one week before the date above fixed for opening said bids, and to preserve proof of such publication.

Reporting on the petition of citizens for the improvement of East Laurel Street, Commissioner Kearny recommended that the street be scarified and graded and rolled, together with other similar streets in this district as soon as possible. Adopted.

Commissioner Kearny introduced the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

A RESOLUTION

Authorizing the International & Great Northern Railway Company to lay its spur track along over and across Comal Street a distance of about 280.5 feet.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Commissioners of the City of San Antonio, Texas, that the International and Great Northern Railway Company is granted permission temporarily to lay a spur track along, over and across Comal Street, beginning at a point in Comal Street at the intersection of the south line of Lakeview Avenue with the center line of Comal Street lead of the International & Great Northern Railway Company's track as now located, said center line being 12 feet more or less west of the east line of Comal Street. Thence with a 12 deg. 30' curve to right, 61.5 feet to a point of compound curvature. Thence with a 9 deg. curve to right 219 feet, more or less, to the west line of Comal Street, for the purpose of temporary emergency to accomodate the United States Government in the handling and storing of supplies.

Said track shall be laid under the direction of the Commissioner of the department of streets and public improvements and the construction thereof shall conform to the regulations imposed by the City. The said track to be removed on demand of the City, or when same has served the Governmental purpose.

In consideration of the granting of this permit the International & Great Northern Railway Company binds and obligates itself to hold the City of San Antonio free and harmless from all damages to persons and property that may result by the reason of the granting of this permit or the exercise of any right thereunder.

AN ORDINANCE

MB-4

Appropriating \$ 28,000.00 for the purpose of widening West Travis Street.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Commissioners of the City of San Antonio, that, the sum of Twenty Eight Thousand (\$28,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same is hereby appropriated out of the 1916 General Fund for the purpose of widening West Travis Street, from Main Avenue to Santa Rosa Avenue, the said widening of said West Travis Street as herein above referred to being deemed by the Commissioners of this City a public necessity.

This ordinance is hereby declared to be of urgent importance for reasons of public welfare apparent herefrom, and the same shall take effect at once.

After the adoption of this ordinance Commissioner Garland stated that he was interested in the opening and widening of West Travis Street, owning property thereon and asked that his vote be reconsidered, and that he be excused from voting; his request was granted.

AN ORDINANCE

MB-5

Appropriating Three Hundred and Ten (\$310.00) Dollars as payment for land out of New City Blocks 357 and 753 to A.W.Seeligson and F.E.Harris for the extension of Jackson Street into Nixon Street.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

That the sum of Three Hundred and Ten (\$310) Dollars be and is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund of 1916 for the payment of a strip of land for the extension of Jackson Street between Cypress and Poplar Streets, connecting Jackson and Nixon Streets in accordance with an agreement entered into between A.W.Seeligson and F.E. Harris and the City of San Antonio, which was accepted by the Commissioners May 22, 1916:

And that a warrant issue therefor payable to A.W.Seeligson and F.E.Harris on their delivery to the City of a deed for said property.

Appropriating \$2500.00 to pay Elder Brothers.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Commissioners of the City of San Antonio, that, the sum of Twenty Five Hundred (\$2500.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same is hereby appropriated out of the 1916 General Fund to pay Elder Brothers for construction of Santa Clara Storm Sewer. Contract Section 123

This ordinance is hereby declared to be of urgent importance for reasons of public welfare apparent herefrom, and the same shall take effect at once.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

That there be and there is hereby appropriated out of the 1916 General Fund, the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars, warrant for which sum shall be made payable to A.G. Startz; this being the full consideration for the execution and delivery by the said A.G. Startz of a general warranty deed to lots 7-8 and 9 in Block 8, situated in what is described on the Bexar County Assessor's book as County Block number 5335, which lots are more particularly described in the said deed dated June 24, 1916; this being the property to be used as a gravel pit by the City.

AN ORDINANCE

Appropriating money for park purposes for the City of San Antonio.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

MB-8
That the City of San Antonio purchase for the purposes of a city park, from J.C.O'Hair the tract of land described in the deed from J.C.O'Hair and Ethel O'Hair his wife, attached hereto and made a part hereof, being a certain tract in City Block A-64, in this City; and the City of San Antonio hereby accepts said deed and agrees to perform all of its terms and conditions and assumes the payment of the six vendors lien notes executed to Mrs. Henry Elmendorf, both individually and as independent executrix of the Estate of Henry Elmendorf, deceased, by J.C.O'Hair described in said deed and also of all the taxes described in said deed, and

That the said J.C.O'Hair and said Mrs. Henry Elmendorf both individually and as independent executrix of the Estate of Henry Elmendorf, deceased, and said tract of land shall be held harmless from any and all liability to the City of San Antonio for any taxes due or to become due on said land; and the City shall also pay and satisfy all other taxes, if any.

That the sum of Three Thousand and Fifty (\$3,050.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same is hereby appropriated from the General Fund of 1916 to pay the Fifteen Hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars cash payment to said J.C.O'Hair and to pay the first of said notes together with interest thereon, all in accordance with said deed; and that city warrants duly issue therefor, and be delivered to persons entitled thereto upon delivery of said deed and said note.

That the said deed, which is hereby approved and by which said land is purchased, reads as follows;

"THE STATE OF TEXAS:

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

COUNTY OF BEXAR:

That we, J.C.O'Hair and Ethel O'Hair, his wife, of the County of Bexar and state of Texas, for and in consideration of the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00), and interest at seven per cent per annum from June 1, 1916, paid and secured to be paid by the City of San Antonio, a municipal corporation, as follows:

The sum of One Thousand and Five Hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars cash in hand paid the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, and the further sum of Eight Thousand and Five Hundred (\$8,500.00) Dollars, represented by six promissory notes which are a vendors lien upon the said property and which were executed by J.C.O'Hair to Mrs. Henry Elmendorf,

both individually and as executrix of the estate of Henry Elmendorf, deceased. The first five of said notes are for the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred (\$1,500) Dollars each, and the last one is for the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars; said notes bear interest at the rate of seven per cent per annum from June 1, 1916 until paid, and provide for the usual ten per cent attorney's fees in case of default, and if placed in the hands of an attorney for ^{collection or} suit is brought on the same, and provide that the holder of the notes has the right to declare all of said notes due in the event of default in the payment of any one of them. The first of said notes becomes due on or before July 5, 1916, and one is due on or before July 5, yearly thereafter. Interest on said notes is payable annually on July 5 of each year, all of which notes and interest thereon said City of San Antonio assumes and agrees to pay as part of this consideration and a vendor's lien is acknowledged upon said property for the purposes of securing the payment of the same. Said notes are more fully described in a deed executed by Mrs. Henry Elmendorf, both individually and as independent executrix of the Estate of Henry Elmendorf, deceased, To J.C.O'Hair on the first day of June A.D. 1916. which deed is recorded in the Deed Records of Bexar County, Texas, and conveys the major part of the land herein conveyed and to which deed reference is hereby made.

And the City of San Antonio in accepting this deed assumes and agrees to carry out all of the obligations which the said J.C.O'Hair assumed in said deed and takes his place in respect thereto, and the said City of San Antonio also agrees to assume, pay off and discharge any and all of the state and County and School back taxes or current taxes that may be owing on said property or to cause the same to be discharged and to hold the said J.C.O'Hair and his grantor the said Mrs Elmendorf, both individually and officially, free and harmless therefrom and the said City of San Antonio does also in accepting this deed release the property described in said deed and discharge it free and acquit and does also discharge the said J.C.O'Hair and his grantor, Mrs. Henry Elmendorf, both individually and officially, free and acquit from any and all city, school and other taxes which may be or become due and owing thereon, and that the said City of San Antonio agrees to discharge the same and to hold said property and said persons free and acquit from any responsibility or liability therefor.

Have Granted, Sold and conveyed, and by these presents do grant, sell and convey unto the said City of San Antonio, a municipal corporation in the County of Bexar, State of Texas, all that certain tract or parcel of land in the City of San Antonio, Texas, in City Block No. A-64, described as follows;

Beginning at the South West corner of a one acre tract of land conveyed by the Estate of Henry Elmendorf, deceased, to the County of Bexar by deed dated May 28th 1904. recorded in volume 231, page 50, Bexar County Deed Records. Thence North 18 deg. East along the Westerly line of said tract 477.1 feet; to the North West corner of another small tract conveyed by said estate to said Bexar County by deed dated August 18th, 1904, recorded in Volume 232, page 105, said deed records; said Northwest corner being also the Southwest corner of a tract conveyed to J.W.Hewitt by J.C. O'Hair and Wm.Chaffin by deed recorded in Volume 416, page 180 said records; Thence Northerly with the Westerly line of said Hewitt tract to its North West corner on the South line of Simpson Street; Thence continuing Northerly across Simpson Street to the North line of said street; thence Westerly with the North line of said Simpson Street to the San Antonio River; Thence down said River with its meanders to the North West corner of a tract of land belonging to Thomas H.Gray; thence South 78 deg. 18 min. East with the Northerly line of said Gray tract to the place of beginning and being

part of a suerte of land in the Labors of the Mission Concepcion originally granted by the Spanish Government to Jose Gomez.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the above described premises together with all and singular the rights and appurtenances thereto in any wise belonging to the said City of San Antonio and its successors and assigns forever, and we do hereby bind ourselves, our heirs, executors and administrators to warrant and forever defend all and singular the said premises unto the said City of San Antonio and its successors and assigns against every person whomsoever lawfully claiming or to claim the same or any part thereof; but the title of said property is not warranted as against any taxes due or to become due thereon and a vendors lien is expressly given and reserved upon said property to secure the payment of the vendor's lien notes hereinabove mentioned.


Commissioner Lambert introduced a Report of the Health Department for the month of June 1916, on Milk, Dairy and Food Inspection, which was ordered filed.
