

REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL  
OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO HELD IN  
THE COUNCIL CHAMBER, CITY HALL, ON  
THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 2, 1971.

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The meeting was called to order at 9:30 A. M. by the presiding officer, Mayor John Gatti, with the following members present: HABERMAN, HILL, BECKER, HILLIARD, MENDOZA, GARZA, NAYLOR, TREVINO, GATTI; Absent: NONE.

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71-40 The invocation was given by Reverend Harold Zirkel, Aldersgate Methodist Church.

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71-40 Members of the City Council and the audience joined in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

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71-40 The minutes of the meeting of August 26, 1971, were approved.

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71-40 Mayor Gatti read the following Proclamation:

WHEREAS, Colonel David R. Scott, the world renowned Astronaut and Commander of the Apollo XV flight to the moon, a son of Brigadier General and Mrs. Tom W. Scott, was born on June 6, 1932 at Fort Sam Houston Station Hospital, and

WHEREAS, Colonel Scott whose middle initial, "R," stands for Randolph in commemoration of his being the first son born to an officer stationed at the new Randolph Air Force Base, and

WHEREAS, Colonel Scott married a San Antonio girl, the former Miss Lurton Ott, daughter of Brigadier General and Mrs. Isaac Ott, and

WHEREAS, Colonel David R. Scott and his family will visit his home town, San Antonio, on Friday, September 3, 1971, and

WHEREAS, San Antonio, the City of his birthplace, would like to express the heartfelt appreciation it shares with a grateful nation through a series of appropriate functions to commemorate the triumphant expedition in outer space under the command of Colonel Scott, and

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WHEREAS, all San Antonians especially the business, civic, and governmental leaders of the City of San Antonio wish to express their sincere gratitude through an orderly and interesting program honoring Colonel Scott.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN GATTI, Mayor of the City of San Antonio, do hereby proclaim Friday, September 3, 1971, to be

"COLONEL DAVID R. SCOTT DAY"

in San Antonio and commend to the community total response to the Greater San Antonio Chamber of Commerce and all others who are charged with the planning and execution of the day long tribute to this courageous American.

71-40 The Clerk read a proposed ordinance which would close Laredo Street between West Travis and West Houston Streets.

Mr. Trevino asked if the general public has been advised that this street will be closed.

Mr. W. S. Clark, Land Division Chief, stated that proper public hearings on the Rosa Verde Project have been held and plans have been announced in the newspapers.

Both Mr. Trevino and Mr. Garza felt that before this street is closed an alternate traffic plan should be worked out. It was felt that this plan should receive heavy publicity so that everyone will be aware of this street closing before it is actually done.

After consideration, Mr. Garza moved that this item be postponed until the staff looks at a means of providing other access to people who need this street. 71-40      DISCUSSION OF AMENDMENTS TO JUNK YARD ORDINANCES

The Clerk read the following ordinances:

An Ordinance amending Chapter 20 of the City Code regulating junk or salvage dealers and junk or salvage yards: Requiring walls or fencing around junk or salvage yards: Requiring certain signs; providing that violations shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200.00; and providing for severability.

An Ordinance amending Chapter 42 of the City Code as to the permitted use of property for junk yard or salvage yard purposes; and providing that any violation shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200.00.

An Ordinance amending Section 10-10 (Fences-erection) of the City Code pertaining to the height of fences so as to allow fences over six feet in height when erected to enclose a junk yard or salvage yard, as required by Chapter 20 of the Code, and providing that violations of such section shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200.00.

Mr. Mendoza stated that he would prefer that these three ordinances be withdrawn from consideration until the Council has had an opportunity to study the situation relating to junk yards. He moved that these three items be withdrawn. The motion was seconded by Dr. Hilliard.

Other members of the Council said that the Council has been working with the City staff for some time and that pertinent points relating to health and fire regulations are being covered.

Mr. George Vann, Director of Housing and Inspections, explained various parts of the proposed ordinances.

Mrs. Haberman offered a substitute motion that all three ordinances be adopted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Hill.

Mr. Robert D. Salvatierra, 142 Fay Street, addressed the Council and urged that the ordinances be adopted.

City Manager Henckel stated that the cooperation of the junk yard owners is needed badly to solve the problems at hand. He felt that a delay in acting on the ordinances would not cause any harm.

Mrs. Haberman withdrew her substitute motion with the proviso that this matter again be brought before the Council in one week.

Mr. Hill then offered a substitute motion that the three ordinances be adopted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Becker. Assistant City Attorney Crawford Reeder ruled that such a motion is in order. The motion failed to carry by the following vote: AYES: Haberman, Hill, Becker, Trevino; NAYS: Hilliard, Mendoza, Garza, Naylor; ABSTAIN: Gatti; ABSENT: None.

The roll call vote on the original motion was as follows: AYES: Hilliard, Mendoza, Garza, Naylor; NAYS: Haberman, Hill, Becker, Trevino; ABSTAIN: Gatti; ABSENT: None.

The City Council then agreed to a one week postponement during which time, Mr. Mendoza and other members of the Council can meet with Mr. Salvatierra and other interested parties concerning the matter of junk yards.

The Ordinance was explained by Mr. Clyde C. McCollough, Jr., Director of Personnel, who stated that this sets up guide lines authorizing investigation of complaints of discrimination and empowers the administrative officer to take corrective action.

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Mr. Trevino stated that he wished to acknowledge the technical assistance of the E.E.O. Officer from Kelly Air Force Base, Mr. Villasano, and Mr. Leonard Gomez from Lackland Air Force Base as well as Mr. McCollough and Mr. Goodloe of the City Personnel Department. He stated that San Antonio is the only City in Texas with this type of ordinance.

Mr. R. G. Toler, Operations Manager for the City Water Board, explained that the passage of this Ordinance by the Council would signify acceptance of the revised master plan recently completed by the Water Board. This is an update of the master plan which was approved by the Council in February, 1966.

Mr. Toler displayed a map showing the previous master plan as well as the new plan. The old plan covered an area of 502 square miles and the revised plan covers some 702 square miles. This is a 25 year major improvement program to include pumping and distribution facilities. It does not address itself to water resources or finance. It is intended that this plan will be further updated in five years.

After consideration, on motion of Mr. Hill, seconded by Mrs. Haberman, the Ordinance was passed and approved by the following vote: AYES: Haberman, Hill, Hilliard, Mendoza, Garza, Naylor, Gatti; NAYS: None; ABSTAIN: Becker; ABSENT: Trevino.

71-40 At the request of Mayor Gatti, Mr. Toler reviewed the status of the Edwards Reservoir. He stated that the water table now stands at 652.31 feet above sea level which is about where it stood a year ago.

As to surface water planning, Mr. Toler stated that the immediate plan is to bring in water from the Cibolo Reservoir which will be south of the City. This reservoir will produce about 20,000

acre feet of water. The Applewhite Reservoir is also under consideration and would provide about 16,000 acre feet of water. Additional water might be brought in from the north or east. It is not expected that surface water will be required before mid 1980's.

71-40 City Manager Henckel stated that his staff is continuing the investigation of the situation at Acme Road and West Commerce which has caused the Library Board to discontinue service in that area. When the investigation is complete, a report will be made to the Council.

71-40 City Manager Henckel advised the Council that as of today, the City has employed 16 persons under the Emergency Employment Program. The Veterans' Coordinator is on the job and is receiving referrals from the Texas Employment Commission of Viet Nam veterans who are given job preference. He commented that this is the fastest he has seen a Federal program implemented.

CITIZENS TO BE HEARD

Mr. Odie E. Davis, Jr., Director of the Alamo Branch of the YMCA, introduced some boys who wished to make a presentation to Mayor Gatti and Dr. Hilliard. James Bradley, speaking for the group, stated that they wished to thank the Council for providing jobs for them this summer. To show their appreciation they presented golden sickles to Mayor Gatti and Dr. Hilliard.

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Mr. Davis read from a plaque which was given to the Council to express appreciation to the City for providing summer jobs.

Mr. Garza stated that there is money budgeted for 1972 for this purpose and it is hoped that this program can get started sooner next year.

Mayor Gatti recognized ex-councilman, Reverend Sam James, in the audience and welcomed him.

Mr. Robert D. Salvatierra, 142 Fay Street, stated that he has worked hard for the south San Antonio area. He asked the Council to set a time when he could meet with a committee to work on the junk yard problems.

Mayor Gatti suggested that he contact Mr. Mendoza and work out a convenient time for a meeting.

Mr. Henry L. Stille, 4607 Golfview, addressed the Council regarding the need to increase industrial growth of the City. He suggested a comprehensive study to determine what might be done to stimulate economic growth. He also suggested that a prize be offered for suggestions.

Mrs. Minnie Williams, 2126 East Crockett Street, spoke to the Council with reference to her complaint two weeks ago about a case of police brutality. She asked what the status of the investigation is.

Mayor Gatti advised Mrs. Williams that the City Manager has given the Council a report. He stated that from the information supplied to him, it appears that the police officer did not overreact or use unnecessary force under the circumstances. He also stated that if Mrs. Williams has additional information or wishes to discuss the incident further she should get in contact with the Chief of Police and make an appointment.

Miss Peggy Cuny, 10919 Lazy Oaks Drive, submitted a petition to the Council. She read from a prepared statement protesting the garbage fee. She objected to everyone being charged the same fee regardless of economic status, the fees charged for collection of the fee by the City Public Service Board and the fact that the public was not consulted. She asked that this fee be reviewed.

Mayor Gatti replied by saying that the matter was well publicized and everyone had an opportunity to discuss it beforehand. He defended the fee as being a fair method of distributing the cost. The proposed fee by the City Public Service Board for collecting the garbage fee is under negotiation.

Mayor Gatti stated that Mr. William J. Wallace has been a very active leader in his neighborhood. After receiving notice that the Library Mobile Unit would discontinue its service to the vicinity of Acme Road and West Commerce Street, he asked Mr. Wallace to do some

investigating and then give the Council his thoughts on the subject.

Mr. Wallace addressed the Council. He has found it to be a fact that a circular was distributed in the area saying that the service would be discontinued because of the threats with pistols and knives. He said that he has talked to the boys that hang around in the area, others who live in the immediate area, and to the people who run a business where the mobile unit is parked. No one could verify that a threat had been made or a weapon displayed. In one instance someone shot at the mobile unit with a BB gun.

There is a complaint that the operator of this mobile unit does not treat the children fairly or decently. Mr. Wallace stated that he felt that if anything did happen that this unit operator asked for it. Because of this treatment of the children, the older boys do "hoorah" him a lot. Mr. Wallace stated that the youths he had talked with had asked him to represent them before the Council. He reminded the Council of other things. Black children have been asked to learn Black history from someone other than a Black man. They consider this something of an insult. There is not a single place of recreation in the area. These Black youths would like to have a place to have community recreation. Not having such a place these young people simply hang around on the corner.

Mrs. Haberman expressed her appreciation to Mr. Wallace for his efforts and his analysis of the problems. She assured Mr. Wallace that she would be very pleased to assist him in any way.

Mr. Wallace's final recommendation to the Council was that this Library service be restored with either a Black man or a Black woman in charge of it.

City Manager Henckel stated that under the Emergency Employment Program there will be a Black community service officer employed for this area.
