

**SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO, HELD IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS, MUNICIPAL PLAZA BUILDING, TUESDAY, MAY 4, 1999**

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99-18 The special meeting was called to order at 3:00 P.M. by the Presiding Officer, Mayor Howard W. Peak, with the following members present: Flores, Guerrero, Prado, Marbut, Bannwolf, Webster and Peak. **ABSENT:** Salas, Vásquez, Menéndez, Garza.

City Clerk Norma S. Rodriguez delivered a brief statement of how the official canvass of the May 1, 1999 election would be conducted, and spoke in explanation of several aspects of the returns. A copy of her statement is made a part of the papers of this meeting.

Mr. Gerry Rickoff, County Clerk of Bexar County, spoke to the professionalism of the City Clerk's staff in this election process, and the joint election process between the County and the City.

Appointed canvassers then assisted City Council members present in the official canvass of the vote from the May 1, 1999 election, after which the City Clerk recited the combined totals in the Mayor and City Council races, and in the bond proposition voting.

The official canvass of the election having been completed, the City Clerk read the following ordinance:

**CANVASSING THE RETURNS AND DECLARING THE RESULTS OF A BOND ELECTION HELD ON MAY 1, 1999; AND OTHER MATTERS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.**

**WHEREAS**, on January 28, 1999, the City Council of the City of San Antonio, Texas, (the "City") ordered an election to be held on May 1, 1999 for the purpose of determining whether the resident, qualified electors of the City would authorize the issue of general obligation bonds by the City, and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has reviewed and investigated all matters pertaining to this election, including the ordering, notices, election officers, holding, and returns thereof, and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council hereby canvasses the returns of this election, at which there was submitted to all resident, qualified electors of the City for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

and rights-of-way necessary thereto such bonds to mature serially or otherwise not more than forty (40) years from their issued date; and any issue or series of said bonds to bear interest at such rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as may be determined within the discretion of said City Council, provided that such rate of interest shall not exceed the maximum rate per annum authorized by law at the time of the issuance of any issue or series of said bonds; and shall the City Council be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in said City sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?"

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has diligently inquired into the poll lists and the official election returns which were duly and lawfully made to this City Council by the judges and clerks holding and conducting such election and which show separately the votes cast in the election; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council hereby finds and determines that the canvassing of the election returns has been conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Code, the City's Home Rule Charter (the "Charter"), and applicable law; **NOW THEREFORE:**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:**

**SECTION 1:** The City Council of the City of San Antonio officially finds, determines, and declares that the election was duly and properly ordered, that proper legal notice of such election was duly given in the English language and the Spanish language, that proper election officers were duly appointed prior to the election, that the election was duly and legally held, that all resident, qualified electors of the City were permitted to vote at the election, that due returns of the results of the election have been made and delivered, and that the City Council of the City has duly canvassed such returns, all in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and of the United States of America, the Charter, and the ordinance calling the election.

**SECTION 2.** The City Council of the City officially finds, determines, and declares that a MAJORITY of the resident, qualified electors of the City voting in such election voted for the qualified electors of the City voting in such election voted FOR the authorization and issuance of \$140,200,000.00 of bonds and the levy and pledge of the tax in payment thereof, as submitted in the Propositions; that the Propositions carried at the election; and that the City Council is hereby

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accordingly authorized to issue and sell general obligation bonds in accordance with the authority granted in the Propositions and with the law

**SECTION 3.** The City Council hereby finds in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code, as amended (the "Code"), that the following votes were cast in the election by voters who were resident, qualified electors of the City, as follows:

**SECTION 4.** All ordinance and resolutions, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Ordinance shall be and remain controlling as to the matters ordained herein.

**SECTION 5.** This Ordinance shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.

**SECTION 6.** If any provisions of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and the City Council hereby declares that this Ordinance would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

**SECTION 7.** It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this Ordinance is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting, including this Ordinance, was given, all as required by Texas law.

**SECTION 8.** This Ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its final passage as provided by the provisions of the Charter.


