MAKING A CONTRACT FOR A TRUCK WITH F. BERNAL.

1. That this ordinance makes and manifests a contract between the city of San Antonio, and the undersigned, hereinafter called Contractor, WITNESSETH:-
2. That the Contractor will supply to the City of San Antonio, one three (3) yard dump truck, to deliver gravel, furnished by the City from City gravel pit, to streets designated by the City Engineer at a rate per load to be agreed upon with the City Engineer.
3. That the Contractor shall, at his own expense, employ the driver, and maintain the truck in a good state of repair.
4. The Contractor will use the truck to haul gravel to the above designated streets and location, at the time and place directed by the City Engineer of the City of San Antonio; and, will accomplish this work in a manner and by the method chosen by the Contractor.
5. This contract may be terminated by either party at will.
6. It is the intention of the parties that the Contractor will be independent; and that neither the relation of principal and agent nor master and servant shall exist.
7. This instrument in writing constitutes the entire agreement of accord and satisfaction between the parties, there being no other written or parole agreement with any officer or employee of the City; it being understood by the undersigned that the Charter of the City of San Antonio requires all contracts to be in writing and approved by ordinance, before the City is bound.

AN ORDINANCE (2545).

PROVIDING FOR THE EXTENSION OF THE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO AND THE ANNEXATION OF CERTAIN ADDITIONAL TERRITORY TO THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY KNOWN AS THE EXPOSITION PARK AND THE WILLOW SPRINGS GOLF COURSE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:-

1. That the following described land and territory lying adjacent to the City of San Antonio and now comprising the area known as Exposition Park and The Willow Springs Golf Course, be and the same is hereby added and annexed to the City of San Antonio; and that said territory hereinafter described shall hereafter be included in the boundary limits of the City of San Antonio; and that the present boundary limits of said City are hereby changed, fixed and amended, so as to include said annexed area within the corporate limits of the City of San Antonio; and which annexed area and territory now and hereby annexed to and included within the enlarged City limits of the City of San Antonio, is more particularly described and included by metes and bounds as follows, to-wit:
2. Beginning at a point in the west right-of-way line of the San Antonio Belt and Terminal Company (also being the east present city limits line) 50 feet north of the center line of Burnet Street extended; thence in an easterly direction along a line 50 feet north of and

parallel to the center line of said Burnet Street extended, 120 feet to a point in the east right-of-way line of the San Antonio Belt and Terminal Company (also being the west line of the Exposition Park tract); thence north along said east right-of-way line of San Antonio Belt and Terminal Company and west line of Exposition Park tract approximately 450 feet to an angle point; thence continuing along said east right-of-way line of San Antonio Belt and Terminal Company and west line of Exposition Park tract north 3° - 50' east, 603.6 feet to an angle point; thence continuing along the west line of Exposition Park tract north 19° - 47' east, 211.0 feet to a point for the northwest corner of said Exposition Park tract; Thence along the north line of Exposition Park tract north 88° - 24' east, 2661.71 feet to a point for the northeast corner of said Exposition Park tract and the northwest corner of the Willow Springs Golf Club tract; thence along the north line of the Willow Springs Golf Club tract with its meanders as follows: north 88° - 26' east, 1846.24 feet; south 81° - 03' east, 700.0 feet; south 81° - 30' east, 1486.0 feet to a point in the west bank of the Salado Creek for the northeast corner of said Willow Springs Golf Club tract; thence in a southwesterly direction along the meanders of said west bank of the Salado Creek as follows: south 48° - 0' west, 168.0 feet; south 32° - 20' west, 230.0 feet; south 54° - 0' west, 550.0 feet; south 63° - 18' west, 356.0 feet; south 50° - 0' west, 200.0 feet; south 22° - 30' west, 268.0 feet; south 10° - 30' east, 118.0 feet; south 10° - 20' west, 163.0 feet; south 12° - 30' west, 111.0 feet; south 40° - 12' west, 128.0 feet; thence across the Salado Creek north 89° - 41' east, 120.0 feet to a point in the east bank; thence following the meanders of the east bank of the Salado Creek in a southwesterly direction as follows: south 65° - 0' west, 100.0 feet; south 56° - 0' west, 306.0 feet; south 51° - 30' west, 282.0 feet; south 60° - 30' west, 70.0 feet; thence leaving said east bank of the Salado Creek, south 0° - 20' west, 552.0 feet, to a point in the north line of the St. Hedwig Road for the southeast corner of said Willow Springs Golf Club tract; thence in a westerly direction along said north line of the St. Hedwig Road with its meanders as follows: south 85° - 21' west, 256.5 feet; south 78° - 31' west, 156.2 feet; south 89° - 55' west, 773.0 feet; north 62° - 10' west, 317.0 feet; north 88° - 49' west, 404.0 feet; north 89° - 30' west, 245.19 feet to the southwest corner of said Willow Springs Golf Club tract and the southeast corner of Exposition Park tract; thence south 89° - 47' west continuing along north line of St. Hedwig Road, 2783.01 feet to a point in the east right-of-way line of the San Antonio Belt and Terminal Company for the southwest corner of the Exposition Park tract; thence north approximately 1370 feet to a point which is 50 feet south of the center line of Burnet Street extended (being the east right-of-way line of San Antonio Belt and Terminal Company); thence in a westerly direction along a line which is 50 feet south of and parallel to the center line of Burnet Street extended, 120 feet to a point in the west right-of-way line of the San Antonio Belt and Terminal Company and the present east city limits line; thence north along west line of the San Antonio Belt and Terminal Company and present east city limits line 100 feet to the place of beginning.

3. That the above boundaries and the above described additional area and territory are hereby annexed to and shall be included within the corporate limits of the City of San Antonio as enlarged and expanded hereby, and that the City of San Antonio shall have jurisdiction over all said area and said enlarged City limits as herein annexed and expanded.

4. That the above described additional territory and area hereby annexed, shall be a part of the City of San Antonio and included within its enlarged boundaries; that the property so added therein to the existing City limits shall bear its pro rata part of the taxes levied by the City of San Antonio; that the inhabitants thereof shall be entitled to all the rights and privileges of all of the other citizens of the City of San Antonio; and that they shall be bound by all of the acts, ordinances, regulations and resolutions of the City of

San Antonio.

5. That the City Engineer be and he is hereby ordered to change the records of his office to conform to the new bounds, boundaries and limits to the City of San Antonio, as annexed, changed and fixed by this ordinance.

6. That the City Tax Assessor be and he is hereby ordered to change the records of his office to conform to the new bounds, boundaries and limits, and shall proceed to assess taxes and collect taxes on the property included in the new bounds, limits and boundaries for the next fiscal year, as now provided by the Charter and Ordinances of the City of San Antonio.

7. All ordinances of the City of San Antonio shall apply to and shall govern all persons and property included within said annexed area hereby annexed to the City of San Antonio as hereinabove specified.

8. After the introduction of this Ordinance, and after it has been amended, as desired by the Commissioners of the City of San Antonio, for final passage, it shall be published in the "COMMERCIAL RECORDER" in the City of San Antonio, one time; and shall not be passed finally thereafter, until at least thirty days have elapsed after said publication.

AN ORDINANCE (2546).

REGULATING THE STORAGE AND HANDLING OF GASOLINE AND
OTHER VOLATILE, INFLAMMABLE OILS AND LIQUIDS IN THE
CITY OF SAN ANTONIO.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:-

SECTION 1. That hereafter all persons or corporations handling, dealing or selling gasoline or other volatile, inflammable oils and liquids shall conspicuously attach to each and every bottle, can and vessel containing the same a label having printed or plainly written thereon the name of the liquid; also the words, "HIGHLY EXPLOSIVE."

SECTION 2. That no dealer in gasoline or other volatile, inflammable oils or liquids, as aforesaid, shall carry, store or settle any of the aforesaid liquids in open vessel or tanks; and in no event shall keep more than five (5) gallons of gasoline or other volatile, inflammable oil or liquids inside of any building, and then only in cans approved by THE NATIONAL BOARD OF FIRE UNDERWRITERS.

SECTION 3. Storage tanks to contain not exceeding Two Thousand (2000) gallons duly approved by THE NATIONAL BOARD OF FIRE UNDERWRITERS and otherwise conforming to the requirements of this Ordinance may be installed and used in Public or Private Filling Stations provided said storage tanks are constructed of at least Seven (7) gauge steel bearing THE NATIONAL BOARD OF FIRE UNDERWRITERS LABEL approved; and tanks shall not be installed under or within the walls of any enclosed building or basement or under any sidewalk or public street.

SECTION 4. No gasoline storage tank having a capacity greater than Two-Thousand (2000) gallons shall be installed at any filling station.

SECTION 5. Not more than Five (5) Two-Thousand (2000) gallon storage tanks may be installed at any filling station. Storage tanks may be placed not less than four (4) feet apart. Each tank must be not less than ten (10) feet from any building, sidewalk or basement, adjoining public or private property. When two (2) or more tanks are installed end to end, there shall be a fire wall of good concrete twelve (12) inches in thickness at the ends between tanks.

SECTION 6. Not more than ten (10) Two-Thousand (2000) gallon storage tanks will be permitted for any super drive-in filling station; and super drive-in filling stations shall have a total ground space of ten thousand (10,000) or more, square feet.

SECTION 7. Storage tanks shall be buried under ground with top of tank not less than three (3) feet below the surface of the ground and below the level of any piping to which tanks may be connected, same shall be surrounded with twelve (12) inches of sand well tamped in place, with twelve (12) inches of sand on top of tank and a slab of concrete not less than six (6) inches under each tank. When a tank is installed in Driveway, then there shall be a slab of reinforced concrete in no case less than six (6) inches in thickness on top of same capable of sustaining a load of two hundred and fifty (250) pounds per square feet. When requested by City, tanks to be securely anchored to prevent possible floating.

Each Two-Thousand (2000) gallon tank installed shall be vented with one and one-half (1½) inch galvanized pipe. When two (2) or more tanks are installed, the vent pipe of each tank shall rise forty-two (42) inches above grade line, and may be joined to a header extension rising four (4) feet above the roof of any building with ten (10) feet of same and terminate in a double goose neck spark protector, both openings of which must be covered with a brass wire screen of at least thirty (30) mesh; and header extension shall be increased in diameter one (1) piping size for the addition of every two (2) tank vents over one (1). All vent and suction lines shall be galvanized pipe, and all joints shall be double swing type.

SECTION 8. No gasoline fill pipe or gasoline pump shall be installed either upon or within a distance of three (3) feet of any sidewalk, public street, or public or private property line. The installation or Replacement of any visible gasoline pump which is capable of holding one (1) gallon, or more of gasoline above ground is hereby prohibited.

SECTION 9. Filler pipe must be made of galvanized iron two (2) inches, or more in diameter entering the top of tank. Upper end of filler pipe must terminate in a screw cap securely locked and must be protected by cast iron filler box, the same to be flush with the grade line. Cross connections permitting gravity flow from one underground tank to another is prohibited.

SECTION 10. Pipe connecting the tank with the pump shall be of galvanized iron and shall enter on top of tank; said pipe must be buried at least eighteen (18) inches below the surface, and any exposed portion thereof must be thoroughly and properly protected. All connecting pipes must drain toward tank. All gasoline must be drawn from the tanks by means of suction pump approved by THE NATIONAL BOARD OF FIRE UNDERWRITERS and bearing the UNDERWRITERS' Label; and said pump shall have an automatic check valve between the pump and storage tank. All connections of pipe and joints from which gasoline is to pass shall be made with a preparation of glycerine and litharge or other approved substances not affected by gasoline, and approved by THE NATIONAL BOARD OF FIRE UNDERWRITERS. No gasoline or other volatile, inflammable liquids shall be conveyed by or through any hose or pipe over the surface of any street or sidewalk.

SECTION 11. Each tank shall have at least one (1) pump connected thereto; and not more than two (2) pumps shall be connected to one (1) storage tank.

SECTION 12. "NO SMOKING" signs must be posted in a conspicuous place at all filling stations.

SECTION 13. Application by petition to establish wholesale distributing stations or gasoline storage tanks and pumps in filling stations in the City of San Antonio shall be made to the Commissioner of Fire and Police before beginning installation; and said petition shall be accompanied by a map or drawing on scale showing the proposed location of tank or tanks with reference to nearby buildings, street and waterway, and showing in detail all proposed pipe lines, pumps and other improvements.

SECTION 14. The Commissioner of Fire and Police shall cause the Chief of the Fire Department Fire Marshal and Plumbing Inspector to make an examination of said petition, accompanying maps and the proposed site of tank or tanks, and make written report to him thereon. Should the petition be granted by the Commissioners of the City of San Antonio, the Plumbing Inspector shall issue a permit to the petitioner upon payment to the License and Dues Collector of the City of San Antonio a fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each storage tank and complete filling device to be installed.

SECTION 15. Every person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of an offense and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum of not less than Ten-Dollars (\$10.00) nor more than One-Hundred-Dollars, (\$100.00) and each day such violation shall continue shall be deemed and shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 16. That all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 17. WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government and public safety that requires this Ordinance to become effective at once; therefore, upon the passage of this Ordinance by a vote of four-fifths (4/5) of the Commissioners, it shall be effective from and after the date of the passage as made and approved by the Charter of the City of San Antonio.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

1. That Section Seven (a) and Seven (b) of a certain Ordinance duly passed and approved on July 18, 1939 and of record in Ordinance Book "I",, page 445, and entitled "AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE INSPECTION OF MEAT AND MEAT FOOD PRODUCTS OFFERED FOR SALE WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF SAN ANTONIO, BEXAR COUNTY, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING THE BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO TO ADOPT RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING SUCH INSPECTION, - PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY," be and the same are hereby amended and substituted so that the fees for inspections made by full-time meat inspectors provided for in each of said sections, shall hereafter be and the same are hereby established, fixed and increased, and the said sections are hereby altered, amended and changed, so that the said fees shall be, and the said sections shall read, as follows:

"SECTION 7. (a) All persons, firms or corporations operating slaughter houses or carrying on a meat slaughtering and packing business, subject to the provisions herein, and whose plants are located without the City Limits of the City of San Antonio and inspected under the supervision of the Health Department of the City of San Antonio by one full-time inspector of the City of San Antonio who has been assigned by the Director of Health to such plant, for full-time inspection, shall pay to the License and Dues Collector of the City of San Antonio, Two Hundred and Twenty Five Dollars (\$225.00) per month for the inspection/s to be made by the full-time inspector.

In the event more than one full-time inspector is required for the inspection work to such plant, additional full-time inspectors will be furnished by the City of San Antonio, for which the permit holder shall pay an additional Two Hundred and Twenty Five Dollars (\$225.00) per month for each additional full-time inspector."

"SECTION 7. (b) All persons, firms or corporations operating slaughter houses or carrying on a meat slaughtering and packing business, subject to the provisions herein, and whose plants are located within the City Limits of the City of San Antonio and inspected under the supervision of the Director of Health, by one full-time inspector of the City of San Antonio who has been assigned by the Director of Health to such plant, for full-time inspection, shall pay to the License and Dues Collector of the City of San Antonio, Two Hundred and Twenty Five Dollars (\$225.00) per month for the inspections to be made by the full-time inspector.

In the event more than one full time inspector is required, for inspection work in such plant, additional full-time inspectors will be furnished by the City of San Antonio, for which the permit holder will pay an additional Two Hundred and Twenty Five Dollars (\$225.00) per month for each additional full-time inspector. The need for inspectors shall be based upon the Rules and Regulations as provided for herein, and further based upon the need of same in the opinion of the Director of Health."

2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby expressly repealed.

AMENDING "AN ORDINANCE TO PUT INTO EFFECT SENATE BILL NO. 277, PASSED BY THE 40TH LEGISLATURE AT THE REGULAR SESSION 1927, ENTITLED 'AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE APPROVAL BY MUNICIPAL AUTHORITIES BEFORE FILING, AND FOR THE FILING AND RECORD OF PLANS, PLATS, OR RE-PLATS OF LAND LYING IN OR WITHIN FIVE MILES OF THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF CITIES HAVING A POPULATION OF 25,000 PERSONS'; AND TO PUT INTO EFFECT SECTION 90 OF THE SAN ANTONIO CHARTER, REGULATING SUBDIVISIONS OF PROPERTY IN THE CITY LIMITS", PASSED AND APPROVED ON THE 22ND DAY OF AUGUST, A. D. 1927.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:-

1. That an ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO PAY INTO EFFECT SENATE BILL NO. 277, PASSED BY THE 40TH LEGISLATURE AT THE REGULAR SESSION 1927, ENTITLED 'AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE APPROVAL BY MUNICIPAL AUTHORITIES BEFORE FILING, AND FOR THE FILING AND RECORD OF PLANS, PLATS, OR RE-PLATS OF LAND LYING IN OR WITHIN FIVE MILES OF THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF CITIES HAVING A POPULATION OF 25,000 PERSONS'; AND TO PUT INTO EFFECT SECTION 90 OF THE SAN ANTONIO CHARTER, REGULATING SUBDIVISIONS OF PROPERTY IN THE CITY LIMITS", passed and approved by the City Commissioners of the City of San Antonio at a regular meeting on the 22nd day of August, A. D. 1927, and of record in Ordinance Book "G", page 424-429, be and the same is amended hereby by the addition of a paragraph following paragraph 19 of said ordinance, in words and figures as follows:-

2. "19-a. The City Engineer shall not approve any plat which contains a lot of less than 4,000 square feet in area nor which abuts less than 40 feet on a street".

3. Said ordinance aforesaid, as amended herein, shall remain in full force and effect and the penalty in said ordinance shall apply to a violation of this amendment.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:-

1. That an election is ordered hereby to be held in the various precincts in the City of San Antonio, Texas, on the 25th day of September, A. D. 1945, and the Mayor is directed to issue his Proclamation calling said election, at which election certain separate propositions to borrow money on the credit of the City of San Antonio and to issue bonds for permanent public improvements within the City of San Antonio and the levy of taxes sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity, shall be submitted to the qualified voters who own taxable property in the City of San Antonio and who have duly rendered the same for taxation as provided in article VI, Section 3-a of the Constitution of Texas; the purposes for which said bonds are desired and the money expended and the permanent public improvements to be constructed are distinctly specified herein as follows, to-wit:-

A-45: INTERREGIONAL HIGHWAY BONDS, \$1,750,000.00

2. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City, and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for the right-of-way for the Interregional Highway and Freeway and access ways thereto to establish and open streets or boulevards, and the appurtenances thereof, to improve traffic conditions and promote public safety in the City, in the amount of \$1,750,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable

semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive.

B-45: AIRPORT ADMINISTRATION BUILDING BONDS, \$1,500,000.00

3. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City, and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to construct an Administration Building at the San Antonio Municipal Airport, and the appurtenances, accessories and fixtures thereof, and necessary additional runways, for the use of the City in the operation of an airport for the benefit of its trade and commerce, in the amount of \$1,500,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive.

C-45: STREET AND BRIDGE BONDS, \$2,000,000.00

4. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City, and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements to build, grade, pave, curb, improve and drain the streets and public ways in the City, and build bridges and culverts appurtenant thereto, and the accessories thereof, and acquire property necessary for said purposes; to improve traffic conditions, public convenience and safety, in the amount of \$2,000,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive.

D-45: STREET MARKER BONDS, \$25,000.00

5. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City, and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to improve the public streets and ways by the erection and installation of street markers and signs for public necessity and convenience, in the amount of \$25,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive.

E-45: GARBAGE DISPOSAL BONDS, \$300,000.00

6. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City, and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements to build and erect one or more incinerators and appurtenances and equipment thereof and to acquire property therefor and to add to and improve present incinerators, to protect the health and safety of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$300,000.00, each bond

being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

F - 45: LIBRARY ADDITION BONDS, \$150,000.00

7. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City, and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to construct an addition and improvements to the Public Library, and the appurtenances thereto, necessary for the operation thereof for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$150,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive.

G - 45: WITTE MUSEUM ADDITION BONDS, \$85,000.00

8. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City, and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements to construct an addition and improvements to the Witte Museum and the appurtenances thereto, necessary for the operation thereof for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$85,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

H - 45: WORLD WAR II MEMORIAL BONDS, \$80,000.00

9. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to construct and equip a Memorial Building and the appurtenances thereof necessary for the use of the City, dedicated to and in honor of the members of the military forces from Southwest Texas, who participated in World War II, adjacent to Brackenridge Park, in the amount of \$80,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for public parks on the South Side of the City, and construct buildings thereon and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, and on other parks in the same area, necessary for the use of the City and the health, recreation and convenience of the inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$100,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

M - 45: PARK CARETAKER HOUSE AND REST ROOM BONDS, \$40,000.00

14. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow

money on the credit of said City, and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to construct Caretaker Houses and Rest Rooms, and appurtenances thereof, in various parks necessary for use by the City and protection of public property, and the health, convenience and comfort of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$40,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

N - 45: COLORED PARK BONDS, \$100,000.00

15. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for a public park, and construct buildings thereon, and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, and on other Colored Parks, necessary for the use of the City, and for the health, recreation and convenience of the colored inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$100,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

O - 45: LOS ANGELES HEIGHTS PARK BONDS, \$10,000.00

16. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to construct buildings in the public park in Los Angeles Heights, and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, necessary for the use of the City, and for the health, recreation and convenience of the inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$10,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

P - 45: RIVERSIDE PARK BONDS, \$65,000.00

17. Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to acquire land for an extension to Riverside Park for the construction of an additional nine holes to the Golf Course, and making improvements to the facilities and appurtenances thereof, necessary for the use of the City and the health, recreation and convenience of the inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$65,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City and to issue bonds of said City for permanent public improvements, to construct four buildings, appurtenances and accessories, to house personnel and equipment, and to acquire property therefor for the use of the City in the establishment and operation of the Fire Department, and to protect the property, safety and convenience of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$150,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of San Antonio be authorized to borrow money on the credit of said City and to issue bonds of the City for permanent public improvements, to construct a building and appurtenances, to house personnel and equipment for a repair shop for the use of the City in the establishment and operation of the Police Department, and to protect the safety and convenience of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$25,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive.

24. The manner of holding this election shall be governed by the laws regulating such elections, made and provided; and only qualified electors who own taxable property in the City of San Antonio who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall vote, and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; and, the ballot to be used in this election shall be an "Official Ballot" arranged in such a manner that the voter at said election may vote either for or against any or all of said propositions.

25. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition A-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for the right-of-way for the Interregional Highway and Freeway and access ways thereto to establish and open streets or boulevards, and the appurtenances thereof, to improve traffic conditions and promote public safety in the City, in the amount of \$1,750,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

26. And those opposed to said Proposition A-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of

the City for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for the right-of-way for the Interregional Highway and Freeway and access ways thereto to establish and open streets or boulevards, and the appurtenances thereof, to improve traffic conditions and promote public safety in the City, in the amount of \$1,750,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

27. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition B-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct an Administration Building at the San Antonio Municipal Airport, and the appurtenances, accessories and fixtures thereof, and necessary additional runways, for the use of the City in the operation of an airport for the benefit of its trade and commerce, in the amount of \$1,500,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-0/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

28. And those opposed to Proposition B-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of the City for permanent public improvements, to construct an Administration Building at the San Antonio Municipal Airport, and the appurtenances, accessories and fixtures thereof, and necessary additional runways, for the use of the City in the operation of an airport for the benefit of its trade and commerce, in the amount of \$1,500,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

29. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition C-45 to issue bonds, as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements to build, grade, pave, curb, improve and drain the streets and public ways in the City, and build bridges and culverts appurtenant thereto, and the accessories thereof, and acquire property necessary for said purposes, to improve traffic conditions, public convenience and safety, in the amount of \$2,000,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal

as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

30. And those opposed to said Proposition C-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements to build, grade, pave, curb, improve and drain the streets and public ways in the City, and build bridges and culverts appurtenant thereto, and the accessories thereof, and acquire property necessary for said purposes; to improve traffic conditions, public convenience and safety, in the amount of \$2,000,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

31. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition D-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to improve the public streets and ways by the erection and installation of street markers and signs for public necessity and convenience, in the amount of \$25,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

32. And those opposed to said Proposition D-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to improve the public streets and ways by the erection and installation of street markers and signs for public necessity and convenience, in the amount of \$25,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

33. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition E-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to build and erect one or more incinerators and appurtenances and equipment thereof and to acquire property therefor and to add to and improve present incinerators, to protect the health and safety of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$300,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years

inclusive."

34. And those opposed to said Proposition E-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements to build and erect one or more incinerators and appurtenances and equipment thereof and to acquire property therefor and to add to and improve present incinerators, to protect the health and safety of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$300,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

35. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition F-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct an addition and improvements to the Public Library, and the appurtenances thereto, necessary for the operation thereof for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$150,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

36. And those opposed to said Proposition F-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct an addition and improvements to the Public Library, and the appurtenances thereto, necessary for the operation thereof for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$150,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

37. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition G-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements to construct an addition and improvements to the Witte Museum and the appurtenances thereto, necessary for the operation thereof for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$85,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as

nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

38. And those opposed to said Proposition G-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct an addition and improvements to the Witte Museum and the appurtenances thereto, necessary for the operation thereof for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$85,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

39. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition H-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct and equip a Memorial Building and the appurtenances thereof necessary for the use of the City, dedicated to and in honor of the members of the military forces from Southwest Texas, who participated in World War II, adjacent to Brackenridge Park, in the amount of \$80,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

40. And those opposed to said Proposition H-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct and equip a Memorial Building and the appurtenances thereof necessary for the use of the City, dedicated to and in honor of the members of the military forces from Southwest Texas, who participated in World War II, adjacent to Brackenridge Park, in the amount of \$80,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

41. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition I-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct an Aquarium and appurtenances necessary for the protection of the property of the City and use of the City, in the Zoo Area on City property adjacent to Brackenridge Park, in the amount of \$75,000.00; each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds

to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

42. And those opposed to said Proposition I-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issue of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct an Aquarium and appurtenances necessary for the protection of the property of the City and use of the City, in the Zoo Area on City property adjacent to Brackenridge Park, in the amount of \$75,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

43. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition J-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct walls and levees on the San Antonio River and its tributaries, to improve and change the channel thereof, and widen and deepen it and acquire property therefor, necessary to prevent or control flood conditions for the protection of the safety and the property of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$200,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

44. And those opposed to said Proposition J-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct walls and levees on the San Antonio River and its tributaries, to improve and change the channel thereof, and widen and deepen it and acquire property therefor, necessary to prevent or control flood conditions for the protection of the safety and the property of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$200,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

45. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition K-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for public parks on the West Side of the City, and construct buildings thereon and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, and on other parks in the same area, necessary for the use of the City and the health, recreation and convenience of

the inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$115,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

46. And those opposed to said Proposition K-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for public parks on the West Side of the City, and construct buildings thereon and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, and on other parks in the same area, necessary for the use of the City and the health, recreation and convenience of the inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$115,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, to levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years, inclusive."

47. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition L-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for public parks on the South Side of the City, and construct buildings thereon and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, and on other parks in the same area, necessary for the use of the City and the health, recreation and convenience of the inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$100,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

48. And those opposed to said Proposition L-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for public parks on the South Side of the City, and construct buildings thereon and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, and on other parks in the same area, necessary for the use of the City and the health, recreation and convenience of the inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$100,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

49. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition M-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed on their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of

bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct Caretaker Houses and Rest Rooms, and appurtenances thereof, in various parks necessary for use by the City and protection of public property, and the health, convenience and comfort of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$40,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

50. And those opposed to said Proposition M-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct Caretaker Houses and Rest Rooms, and appurtenances thereof, in various parks necessary for use by the City and protection of public property, and the health, convenience and comfort of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$40,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

51. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition N-45 to issue bonds as described therein shall have printed on their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for a public park, and construct buildings thereon, and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, and on other Colored Parks, necessary for the use of the City, and for the health, recreation and convenience of the colored inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$100,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

And those opposed to said Proposition N-45 to issue bonds shall have printed upon their ballots, the words: "AGAINST the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to acquire property for a public park, and construct buildings thereon, and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, and on other Colored Parks, necessary for the use of the City, and for the health, recreation and convenience of the colored inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$100,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

53. That at said election voters desiring to support Proposition O-45 to issue bonds as described therein, shall have printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR the issuance of bonds and to borrow money on the credit of said City, for permanent public improvements, to construct buildings in the public park in Los Angeles Heights, and improvements, facilities and appurtenances thereof, necessary for the use of the City, and for the health, recreation and convenience of the inhabitants thereof, in the amount of \$10,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years, payable serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

56. to house personnel and equipment for a repair shop for the use of the City in the establishment and operation of the Police Department, and to protect the safety and convenience of the inhabitants of the City, in the amount of \$25,000.00, each bond being of the denomination of \$1,000.00; said bonds to bear interest from date at a rate to be fixed by ordinance not to exceed 2-1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually; and the Board of Commissioners to be authorized to assess, levy and to collect taxes upon property in the said City, sufficient to pay the annual interest and to provide a sinking fund of at least 2 per cent to pay the bonds at maturity; said bonds to mature within a period of 20 years serially in yearly installments as nearly equal as practicable from 1 to 20 years inclusive."

69. That said election shall be held within the City of San Antonio, and in each and all of the various election precincts thereof, variously located in each of the several wards of said City, as said election precincts are now fixed and established, and being the same election precincts used in recent elections; and said election herein ordered shall be held during the hours required by law and at the place in each such respective election precinct set opposite the number of each precinct, in the following table, to-wit:

AMENDING AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE CONSTRUCTION, ALTERATION, MAINTENANCE, REPAIR AND REMOVAL OF BUILDINGS WITHIN THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO, AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF", PASSED AND APPROVED JANUARY 13, 1913, BY AMENDING SECTION 2 THEREOF BY REPEALING SECTION 2-A AND SECTION 2-B.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:-

1. That Section 2 of an Ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE CONSTRUCTION, ALTERATION, MATINENANCE, REPAIR AND REMOVAL OF BUILDINGS WITHIN THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO AND PRESCRIBING PENALTTES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF", passed and approved on January 13, A. D. 1913, be, and the same is hereby amended by repealing Section 2-A and Section 2-B, as follows:

"SECTION 2-A. SUSPENSION OF CODE PROVISIONS: For the duration of the present state of war between the United States of America: and Germany, Italy and Japan, or until this ordinance be sooner repealed, building permits as now required by the ordinances of this City may be granted for Defense Housing construction although the drawings and specifications therefor do not conform to the requirements of the Building Code insofar as said Code relates to the use of critical materials, as listed and set forth in the Defense Housing Critical List of the War Production Board of the United States Government effective February 24, 1942; and subsequent amendments thereto and revisions thereof. All applications for permits must be accompanied by Preference Certificates and Priority Numbers issued by the War Production Board"; passed and approved the 16 day of March, A. D. 1942.

"SECTION 2-B. SUSPENSION OF CODE PROVISIONS: For the duration of the present state of war between the United States of America and Germany, Italy and Japan, or until this ordinance be sooner repealed, building permits as now required by the ordinances of this City may be granted for a project, building or the operation of a plant for manufacture of machines, goods, materials or other articles necessary to carry on the war in the opinion of the War Production Board where construction; repairs or alterations are required so as to conform to the requirements of the Priorities Division of the War Production Board, and this is to be evidenced by Preference Rating Certificates by the War Production Board covering such Defense project or industry. All applications for permits must be accompanied by Preference Rating Certificates with the ratings as established by the War Production Board. Any manufacturing plant operating on Government contract without Preference Rating Certificate but evidenced by an Army or Nany Contract likewise comes under this provision. In no event shall any permit be issued lowering the requirement of the National Board of Fire Underwriters' Building Code"; passed and approved on the 19th day of March, A. D. 1942.

1. That this ordinance makes and manifests a contract between the City of San Antonio, party of the First part, and F. G. Rodgers & Company, F. G. Rodgers, Proprietor, Contractor, party of the second part, in words and figures as follows, WITNESSETH:-

2. That the parties to these presents, each in consideration of the agreements on the part of the other, do hereby mutually covenant and agree, the City for itself and its successors, and the Contractor for himself, his heirs executors and administrators, as follows, to-wit:

3. The Contractor at his own cost and expense shall supply all labor, material and accessories necessary and proper for the purpose, and at his own cost and expense make a

comprehensive and detailed audit of every department of the City, except the Water Works Department, Library Department and Public Service Board, and verify in detail all revenues, cash receipts, funds, indebtedness and accruals and disbursements, the scope of the audit not being limited to the mere summarization of the receipts and disbursements as shown by the records, for the period from the 1st of June, A. D. 1944 to the 31st of May, A. D. 1945.

4. At the completion of the audit, the Contractor shall deliver to the City 7 separate detailed written reports thereof, showing the financial condition of the City, of each of the departments thereof, the condition and status of the bonded debt, and all other matters necessarily and properly included in a complete and comprehensive audit.

5. The figures and form of the financial report of the Contractor shall be reconciled with the general ledger and the quarterly reports of the City Auditor, and shall conform to the stipulations of the Charter and the Ordinances of the City of San Antonio made and provided governing the fiscal affairs of the City.

6. All errors and omissions, if any, of whatever character observed in the books and accounts during the progress of the audit, shall be duly noted and reported to the Mayor and Commissioners; and all points of interest on matters of importance necessary for their attention will be taken up with them immediately, by the agent of the Contractor in charge of the work, who will consult with the Mayor and Commissioners from time to time, or as often as it seems necessary, with respect to the progress, general conduct and result of this work.

7. The Contractor acknowledges that he accepts the above specifications of the work to be performed by him, and admits that the same is sufficient for its intended purpose, and that the work can be executed successfully and completed in accord therewith without any additional work other than such as is necessarily implied and included, and to be inferred herefrom, and that any details that may have been omitted in the description shall be done as if the same were specifically stated and without additional charge.

8. The Contractor shall give personal attention to the execution of this work, and shall employ only competent, skillful persons therefor, and if at any time the Mayor shall notify the Contractor that any person employed in said work, is, in the opinion of the Mayor, incompetent, unsuitable, unskillful, disobedient or disrespectful toward any officer of the City, or any employee of the City, then the Contractor shall forthwith discharge such employee, and such employee shall not again be employed by the Contractor on said work without the written consent of the Mayor. These communications are privileged for the good of all parties.

9. The City shall have all of its account books, records, bills and vouchers in regular order, and they shall be available to the Contractor for the purpose of this audit and examination, but none of the same shall be removed from the City Hall by the Contractor or any of his employees; and the City of San Antonio shall furnish the Contractor reasonable quarters and facilities in said City Hall.

10. Should any dispute arise between the Contractor and the City, or any officer thereof, as to the manner of the performance of the whole, or any part of the work, the decision of the Auditor of the City of San Antonio shall be final and conclusive in such matters; and any doubt as to the meaning of any part of this contract shall be explained and decided conclusively by the City Attorney.

11. The Contractor shall not assign, transfer, convey or sub-let this contract, or any part thereof, without the consent of the City endorsed hereon in writing, and the Contractor shall not assign any of the moneys, or any other consideration, to become due and payable by the City under this contract.

12. The work under this contract shall be begun immediately after the execution, and shall be continued with dispatch and without interruption, and be completed as soon as

practicable. Seven and one-half ($7\frac{1}{2}$) hours shall constitute a day's work under the per diem term for services rendered.

13. That, subject only to the price, terms and stipulations of this contract, the written estimate and certificate of the City Auditor shall be final and conclusive to fix and determine any or all amounts payable hereunder to the Contractor, by the City, for which amounts such estimates of the Auditor shall be a condition precedent to the right of the Contractor to receive payment; and, also to fix and determine any, and all amounts payable for the Contractor or their sureties chargeable against the Contractor and payable to the City by reason of the performance by the City, or the non-performance by the Contractor, of any work herein undertaken by the Contractor.

14. In consideration of the faithful performance of this contract by the Contractor and and the completion of the work herein stipulated, the City of San Antonio agrees and shall be and is hereby bound and obligated to pay the Contractor for said work at the rate of \$25.00 per day for Senior Accountants and \$15.00 per day for Junior Accountants, the maximum not to exceed \$6,000.00.

15. The Contractor shall render a progress report on the 12th and 28th day of each month during the course of the work showing the nature and extent of the work done, the accounts examined on the work, the rate, the time and the amount for each man, and the total amount due for that period; and, on receipt of it, confirmed by the certificate of the City Auditor, the Contractor shall be paid an amount equal to eighty-five (85%) per cent of the compensation earned during such period, computed on the per diem basis specified.

16. The Contractor shall not be paid any money in excess of the amount paid upon such estimate, unless and until each and all of the stipulations and requirements of this contract shall have been faithfully performed by the Contractor, and the final report delivered to the City, and accepted by the City, in accord with this contract and such completion, delivery and acceptance, evidenced by a resolution of the Commissioners of the City of San Antonio.

17. Thirty days after the date of the acceptance of such work, the final estimate for final settlement upon this contract shall be prepared by the Auditor and the same having been first approved by the signature of the Mayor and the Auditor, the City shall pay to the Contractor the amount of the final estimate; taking into consideration all amounts previously retained from the estimates remaining payable to the Contractor, and deducting from the amount of such final estimate and retaining, any and all sums which are to be deducted by the City, or due by Contractor to the City, or claimed for labor furnished by any person, or which should be retained and held by the City for any reason.

18. Should the work or any part thereof, prescribed by this contract, be abandoned by the City, this contract shall terminate to the extent thereof; but the Contractor shall be paid in full for the services performed prior to the abandonment, but not otherwise, and such payments shall amount to full satisfaction and accord for any debt or demand caused thereby.

19. The Contractor shall comply with all laws regulating labor and relating to employers and employees, and all other things being equal the Contractor shall use and employ San Antonio labor and material, and in the event the Contractor shall employ more than five persons in the performance of the work described in this contract, every person employed shall be a qualified voter of the City of San Antonio.

20. Six Thousand Dollars is appropriated out of the 1945 General Fund - Audit Department, to pay the estimates as the same accrue.
