

REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL  
OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO HELD IN  
THE COUNCIL CHAMBER, CITY HALL, ON  
THURSDAY, APRIL 22, 1976.

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The meeting was called to order at 9:30 A.M., by the presiding officer, Mayor Lila Cockrell, with the following members present: PYNDUS, BILLA, CISNEROS, BLACK, HARTMAN, ROHDE, TENIENTE, NIELSEN, COCKRELL; Absent: NONE.

76-19 The invocation was given by The Reverend Harold H. Zirkel, Aldersgate Methodist Church.

76-19 Members of the City Council and the audience joined in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States.

76-19 The minutes of the meeting of April 15, 1976 were approved.

76-19 DR. ROBERT S. TATE

Councilman Nielsen asked that the minutes reflect the passing of Rev. Dr. Robert S. Tate, Pastor of St. Andrews Methodist Church. Dr. Tate served many civic functions and was advisor to governors and many others in the field of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. The City will miss him greatly.

76-19 GOODWILL VISIT BY KING ANTONIO LIV  
AND THE QUEEN OF THE ORDER OF THE ALAMO

The City Council was favored with a visit by King Antonio LIV and the Queen of the Order of the Alamo. King Antonio, in the person of Jack Lewis, Jr., expressed appreciation to the City Council and the City staff for their splendid support of all of the Fiesta activities. He especially thanked the staff, particularly the Parks and Recreation Department, for their efforts in making the River Parade so successful. He then introduced the Queen, Julie Steves, and the Princess, Nell Herff.

Members of the City Council each greeted the visitors after which the King presented gifts to all of the Council members.

Mayor Cockrell welcomed the visitors to the meeting and awarded each of them a certificate naming them Alcaldes of La Villita.

A RESOLUTION  
NO. 76-19-25

AUTHORIZING THE CITY PUBLIC SERVICE BOARD TO SUBMIT A PROPOSAL TO THE FEDERAL ENERGY ADMINISTRATION REQUESTING A FEDERAL GRANT FOR PARTICIPATION IN A DEMONSTRATION PROJECT RELATING TO THE EFFECT OF RATE RESTRUCTURING AND LOAD MANAGEMENT UPON THE ENERGY CONSERVATION POTENTIAL OF CUSTOMERS.

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The Resolution was explained by Mr. Jack Spruce, General Manager of the City Public Service Board. He said that the deadline for presenting this resolution to the Federal Energy Administration is April 26th. This is an application for funds to review various rate structures which may in the long run improve load management and dividing cost of service among CPS customers.

Council members expressed their appreciation for the CPS effort in this new approach to rate structures.

After consideration, on motion of Dr. Cisneros, seconded by Mr. Hartman, the Resolution was passed and approved by the following vote: AYES: Pyndus, Billa, Cisneros, Hartman, Rohde, Teniente, Nielsen, Cockrell; NAYS: None; ABSENT: Black.

KELLY AIR FORCE BASE REDUCTION IN FORCE

The following conversation took place:

MAYOR LILA COCKRELL:      Now, then, we have another - a resolution that has been proposed in regard to the amicus curiae brief. May I have Council consent to call for that at this time.

CITY ATTORNEY JIM PARKER:      I would prefer to discuss that in executive session prior to your taking action on that, if it's at all possible, Mayor Cockrell.

MAYOR COCKRELL:      Well, all right. Since the City Attorney has requested it, I feel we have to comply with that.

DR. HENRY CISNEROS:      Madam Mayor, we have a couple of citizens here who would like to speak on the subject and I would hesitate to keep them here all day. I would like consent from the Council just to introduce the item in order that we can hear the citizens. Then if we have to, have an executive session later before final action. I would be completely amenable to that but there are some people here who are taking time off from their jobs.

MAYOR COCKRELL:      Well, may we then just hear - may I see how many citizens.....

DR. CISNEROS:      I think there's just one person that's going to speak.

MAYOR COCKRELL:      Mr. Marcelino Gutierrez.

DR. CISNEROS:      Mayor, if I may just introduce what this is about.

MAYOR COCKRELL:      Yes, certainly.

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DR. CISNEROS: Basically, it is the following. That after careful review of the petition that has been filed in the Federal District Court for the Western District of Texas concerning massive separations and downgrading of civilian employees of the Department of the Air Force, I personally concluded that it is of critical importance that the City lend the full weight of its legal muscle and public stature to support the injunctive position that has been filed. Apparently, there's a good deal of precedent for a general local purpose government being found to have standing in cases of this sort as an injured party before the court. There's the case of Richard Gabor Air Force Base in Missouri where the local government was able to get in fact injunctive relief. There's the case of Selma, Alabama where under the threat of a lawsuit, the federal government changed its plans. There's also the case of a Navy facility in Prince Georges County where although the facts of the case were differently, local purpose from government was determined to have standing and that was the county government in that case.

It is true that the facts of the cases vary in every instance and that the legal detail is not exactly the same but I think the thing that we have to remember is that the first time one of these cases was filed, the very first time, they were cutting brand new laws and we have a significant precedent close enough to this case that I think we have a fairly good standing as a local government filing not as a plaintiff but an amicus curiae brief which is a friend of the court supportive of the suits that have been filed. The rationale for it is simply this, Mayor, that we in San Antonio have been hurt very badly and will be hurt worse when the full implications of the Kelly cuts take effect. It's my position that it is unacceptable for this government or the leadership of this community to try to deal as to trading off one cut against another cut in the San Antonio area.

I think our position is better served in San Antonio by fighting tooth and nail for every single job, going on record as being the City where if the federal government decides that it's going to make cuts, they're going to have to make them in this City fighting, pulling, scratching, fighting hard in San Antonio for each and every single job. They can decide to make cuts in San Antonio but they have to know beforehand when it comes to San Antonio to take jobs from here, they're going to be in a tough fight. Some people have suggested that that's not a good position to be in. I submit that in dealing with an institution like the Defense Department that it really is the only position that we as the City can afford to be in.

The Economic Development Foundation is working on bringing new jobs to San Antonio and they're extremely fortunate when they can get a plant that brings 150 or 200 or 500 jobs and here in one fell swoop, we're talking about the loss of 2,000 positions in San Antonio...some \$30 million worth of payroll, some \$71 million worth of economic implications to our City. I think we have a stake as a City government and we need to fight for every single job. I think we're entering on an era in San Antonio where the key issues about the future of this community are going to be economic issues, not only expanding our base but also maintaining what we have and we as a City government need to take a strong, firm position in that regard.

MAYOR COCKRELL: All right. I'd like to call on Mr. Pyndus first and then Mr. Gutierrez.

MR. PHIL PYNDUS: Thank you, Mayor. Because I take an opposing view from Councilman Cisneros, I feel that I'd like to get this into the records too because I feel it would be irresponsible for the Council to legally intervene even in a friend of a court lawsuit between this local union and the federal government. I think it sets a precedent, an unwise precedent, for future Council deliberation and I think it also jeopardizes San Antonio's chance of being considered in future job shuffling. We have elected Congressmen from this area who are working in Washington to see that San Antonio is treated fairly and I do not feel we should jeopardize their efforts.

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Yesterday, only yesterday, Senator Bentsen urged the Air Force to investigate the possibility of consolidation of all civilian personnel management operations at Randolph Air Force Base. Yesterday, the Mayor met with Secretary of Defense Rumsfeld and the Secretary of Defense indicated San Antonio would receive fair consideration in future job shuffling. Our Mayor and Council and County officials have publicly voiced their strong concern regarding the economic impact upon our community's well being if government jobs are continuously reduced.

I recommend and urge the Council to not become legally involved, legally involved, in this lawsuit because I do not feel such action will be in the best interest of all Air Force governmental employees who might be phased out in future defense consolidations by the Defense Department. I also feel that such a suit would definitely strain relations between this City and local military installations and personnel. Thank you.

MAYOR COCKRELL: All right. At this point, I think we could hear from Mr. Gutierrez. We did state that we're going to have an executive session before we take any further action. Yes, Mr. Gutierrez.

MR. MARCELINO GUTIERREZ: Mayor Cockrell, members of the City Council. My name is Marcelino Gutierrez and I would like to point out to this Council the importance of the City joining the legal injunction filed by IMAGE in order to stop the manpower cuts at Kelly Air Force Base. It is very unfortunate that government officials, politicians and businessmen are not aware of what the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 means. There are too many persons that believe that this act deals with ecology only but such persons are misinformed for it is this law that provides a legal and a critical mechanism and procedure on how to treat a community.

If the Air Force had made an environmental impact study as prescribed by law prior to ordering these cuts, then the Air Force itself, the businessmen, the developer, the school district, City and County officials would have already been apprised as to what the effects of such cuts would be on the social and economic position of the community. In brief, what it means is that if the study had been conducted as required by the 1969 act, then all of the above mentioned private and governmental entities would know just exactly what these cuts mean to the community. Therefore, the Air Force, by omitting this study, whether intentionally or unintentionally, has kept the community ignorant of this fact and by not disseminating this information, the community is still unaware that an injunction filed under the 1969 act is a vehicle which gives the community the right to protect its citizens.

It is the moral and legal obligation of this Council to protect its citizens for all public officials are elected with the intent that they not only administer but that they also protect and initiate any action that enhances the well being of this community. Therefore, please do not take the position that by filing the injunction, this will displease the present political and Air Force administration.

Let me remind you that since 1969, Kelly Air Force Base has lost over 9,000 positions. This trend has not been any different in any other military installation. The Defense Mapping Agency at Fort Sam is presently being threatened with a possible closing of its office which will affect 200 more employees and an additional payroll of \$3.2 million.

Furthermore, the 1969 act was designed for citizens to use this law to insure that an avenue of relief is available in order to clarify and protect the rights of a community. This injunction is no different than when a fireman or a policeman that has been suspended uses the grievance procedures as established by the Fire and Police Civil Service Commission. Therefore, as a citizen and as a member of IMAGE, I appeal to this Council that you take the positive steps such as filing an injunction in order to protect Kelly Air Force Base...for if we do not stand up for our rights, then our other military bases will undoubtedly probably also be affected in the very near future and all of this due to

public and private apathy. In closing, please let me remind you that IMAGE and other organizations are actively collecting signatures on a petition that the City file an injunction but we should all understand that we, in fact, that although the Defense budget has been cut, it was not Congress that has stated that Kelly Air Force Base would have to bear the brunt of one-third of each cut. If Kelly Air Force Base should be affected, then it should be affected on an equitable basis.

Let me also remind you that while all of us engage in the fun-filled festivities of Fiesta Week and celebrate and enjoy ourselves, there are over 5,000 families who are right now facing a bleak future if nothing is done between now and May. Thank you, members of the Council.

MAYOR COCKRELL: All right. I would like to make one or two comments in response. First of all, I do feel that you have not had a situation where this City Council has been apathetic. I do think that we have worked very, very hard. We have talked to all of our legislators, to our Congressmen. Yesterday I met with the Secretary of Defense. We have been working very hard over a period of several months to see if there is any way that we could avert this particular problem.

Now, what is under consideration, what has been introduced is a resolution which the Council is reviewing and will meet with our City Attorney in executive session which would involve us to the extent of filing a friend of the court brief. That will be considered by the Council after they have had the opportunity to meet with the City Attorney and get his comments in executive session. But I do want to assure you that every member of the City Council is very concerned about this problem and we are doing everything that we know how to do in order to try to fight for our citizens in this matter.

Yesterday, when I met with the Secretary of Defense, we filed a letter outlining all of the points that you have made. We pointed out not only to the Kelly cuts but to the impending cuts at the Defense Mapping Agency. We pointed out our desire to attract the civilian air personnel office and also made a number of other suggestions. We invited many community organizations who joined with us and the Secretary at least promised to study all of those documents very, very carefully and to review them as we go into these next few months. He did not give me any assurance however, that he could hold back this impending cut. I think Dr. Cisneros' resolution is at least something that we should review and then determine after discussing with our attorney the appropriateness of proceeding. But just, on behalf of the Council, I don't want any one in this City to feel that there is any lack of emphasis or interest or putting forth a maximum effort by this Council because I think everyone is ready to go to bat to do everything that we can appropriately do.

DR. D. FORD NIELSEN: Madam Mayor, I'm sure you remember about a year ago, that both this Council and the previous Council have sent strong worded resolutions, official documents, what have you, to the Department of Defense, the President, the Congressmen and everybody else back then trying to avert and prevent the cuts that are now almost at hand. I think what we really ought to be doing Madam Mayor, Henry, is much what San Diego did about 16, 17 years ago. Face up to a tough reality and begin to get the private sector involved and the public sector wherever it can and getting the jobs in the private sector that will absorb the federal cut. I think that's where we should unite, not get hung up over whether we're for or against something because we do or do not file a friend of the court brief. Let's not divide on that, okay.

MR. GLEN HARTMAN: While I fully agree with Dr. Nielsen's point to what needs to be energized as the private sector. I think this is obviously the way it's going to have to go. I think that this is something that we have begun to recognize, I think we need to push much harder to expand our economic base in the private sector. However, I think by the same token, I think that it behooves the City to be very

closely tied to the matter of federal employment in the San Antonio area. As the Defense Secretary stated yesterday, San Antonio will continue to be the area of high level or a high target in terms of federal employment in the future. But I think that it behooves us to express our concern to the Defense Department and to the federal government when actions are being taken that could affect our economic situation in San Antonio and that is essentially what is being proposed here. This is an expression of concern. It is not really the enjoining of the suit as would be indicated as though we were a party to the suit that it is rather a statement...a statement of our very strong concern over this loss and which relates to our concern as a City for our economy. And I think this is why I think this is a very appropriate vehicle for that purpose.

MAYOR COCKRELL: Well, let me just make this suggestion that we not - we're not going to vote on this anyway, let's just hold further comment until after we've had the opportunity to review it with the City Attorney in executive session from the legal point of view. But we thank you, sir, and let me say our thoughts are most certainly with you. Our very strong actions have been with you and we appreciate your being here.

MR. GUTIERREZ: With your permission, I'd just like to add a couple of other comments. First of all, I want to thank you for your past efforts and thank the Council. However, we all know that we have - up to this point, we have been unsuccessful and this appears to be the only alternative and the last resort. I submit to you that this community is not prepared at this point to absorb the loss of over 1300 jobs and that the best possible avenue would be to distribute these cuts throughout several years as (inaudible). And I would like to also urge you to please consider this in open session so that this would be in public view and open to all the citizens of San Antonio.

MAYOR COCKRELL: Any final vote will certainly be - the final discussion will be but there are certain matters, legal matters that I think in connection with litigation, that the City Attorney has requested that we meet with him on. Thank you, sir.

(CITY CLERK'S NOTE:) Later in the day the City Council held an executive session to discuss this matter with the City Attorney. Following that meeting, Mayor Cockrell made a public announcement.

MAYOR COCKRELL: The City Council is giving most serious consideration to the proposed resolution calling for the filing of an amicus curiae brief. We will place the resolution on the agenda for final consideration next Thursday. There were several persons who needed additional time to study certain aspects but I can assure you that it is being given very serious consideration. It will be on for final action next Thursday.

PARKING IN BRACKENRIDGE PARK

Councilman Rohde brought up a parking problem in the vicinity of the Joske Pavilion in Brackenridge Park. He said that at a certain picnic held in the area, many people found tickets for illegal parking on their cars. Several cars were hauled away. He said that he felt closer coordination should be in effect between the Park Rangers and the Parks Department.

Mr. Darner said that the area concerned is a tow away zone. Sunday is a peak load and a blockage at this point presents serious traffic problems.
